WALL STREET REMAINS DULL

During Short Session of the Stock Market Business Remains at Standstill

NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—Today's short session of the stock market may be dismissed with the bald statement that business during the greater part of the two hours was almost at a standstill. Price changes in few instances were important and the market apparently was left to its own devices. Some of the semi-active issues were not quoted at all and the net result was a mixture of losses and gains, the latter predominating.

READ THIS!

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17.—Instead of the familiar old towpath mule, giant electric locomotives will move the shipping through the Panama canal locks. The ordinary locomotive would spin its wheels wildly and ineffectively upon the usual form of steel rail when its draw bar felt the weight of a 20,000-ton warship. But the big electric locomotives will be geared to the tracks by a middle rail cut into the form of a rack, giving enormous traction power.
