The commencement exercises, now on at Broadbuss Institute, will doubtless be the most brilliant in the history of any school, not that the students are any brighter or more intelligent than those who graduated in former years, or that the faculty is more superior, although it is believed to be one of the best the institution has ever had, but on account of the fact that the friends of the school have placed it in position to give the best. Financial support goes a long way in making a commencement what it ought to be. The future will likely bring forth even more brilliant commencements, depending altogether on the support the denomination and the people of the state give it. The prospects are encouraging for a heartier support than ever, and that means better and greater work, and grander commencements.

The Methodist denomination in this district has a splendid movement on, that of building handsome church edifices. This section of country not many years past was conspicuous for its dilapidated, ancient and poor church edifices. That was not an indication, however, that the people did not worship in spirit and truth, but there is nothing too good to be devoted to the services of the Lord, and the Methodists have awakened to that fact. There are other denominations which are advancing in this line to some extent, but greater progress could be made. There has not been in the history of the county a time better adapted to the erection of modern and beautiful church buildings than the present, with money so plentiful and so much prosperity in the land.

The street sprinkler, from present indications, is not likely to be used this year in Clarksburg, unless more satisfactory arrangements can be made at the city itself take it in hand. Several business men have refused to contribute 25 cents a month to its operation, preferring to spend an hour or so each day with the hose. Time does not appear to be very valuable, or else something is radically wrong. There is no business man in Clarksburg who can afford to give an hour of his time daily or that of one of his clerks or employers for a penny.

A spectacular feature of the trial of one of the slot machine men was the presence of preachers and saloon keepers. What the real object of the presence of them was no one really knows. The jury and the court are sworn to govern themselves according to the law and the evidence, and every one recognizing that fact their presence could scarcely be construed to mean that they were there to prejudice or influence the court and jury. Since that is the case, the object must have been curiosity or knowledge with which to govern future action.

Senator Mark A. Hanna has not expressed himself as being opposed to the nomination of Roosevelt for the Presidency, notwithstanding the studied attempt of certain Democratic papers to make it appear he has done so. All that he has said is that he is opposed to the Ohio state convention this year endorsing Roosevelt for the Presidency. He is of the opinion that that should be left to the convention prior to the national convention, which will select its delegate.

An anti-slot-machine victory was scored in the circuit court in the first trial of this kind. All others of like kind will likely end the same in this court. What the result will be in the supreme court is a matter of speculation, but the decision of the circuit court will in all probability have considerable bearing on the conduct of the slot machine. According to the present verdict, all who play the slot machines are gamblers.

The baseball game Monday shows that bloomers still remain an attraction with American men. They will go miles to see girls in bloomers, though they may use baseball as a pretext, and yet the sight is about as uninteresting as any one could look at. Even some women, who do not wear bloomers, like to see them worn or they like to see girls playing baseball. Both sexes witnessed the game yesterday.

The colleges and universities may teach athletics to the lady students, but base and foot ball appears to be a little too masculine to be at all feminine, and those who engage in it, whether they be of collegiate training or not, do not add anything to their graces.

PRISONERS TAKEN TO JAIL

Sheriff John A. Fleming and Deputy Sheriff Fred Fleming left this morning with eight prisoners for Weston to place them in the Lewis county jail. Some will serve time there, while others are taken for the purpose of safe keeping, until they are given trials. The prisoners were Oscar Greathouse and William and George Hanschumaker, sentenced to serve six months; William Green, four months; Frank Seals, six months; John Jameson, colored, six months, and Pleasant Marshall and Thomas McHale, who have not yet been convicted. Before these were taken out the jail was over-run, there being two cells with four each in them, one with five and another with seven, making twenty in all.
