RIGS FOR TESTS

Are Being Erected at Various Points in the Oil Fields of This County, Indicating Search For New Pools.

In the lower end of the Folsom district, the South Penn Oil Company has completed its No. 48 on the Robinson tract and the well is producing 160 barrels a day.

On the east side of the district, in this county, the same company has drilled its No. 3 on the C. E. Robinson farm 24 feet into the stratum and is fishing for a string of tools. The second test on the Jesse Ashcraft farm has been drilled 96 feet into the stratum and has developed no oil or gas. The second test on the Mary Holdreth farm has been drilled 52 feet into the stratum and is fishing.

On Ten Mile creek the Star Oil and Gas Company is building the rig for a test on the John Williams farm. The same company has the rig completed for a test on the Jesse P. Randolph farm. R. T. Lowndes has made the location for a test on the Samuel Gain farm. In this county, New York parties have drilled their test on the William McWhorter farm to a depth of 700 feet and are fishing.
