Hugh Romine, No. 3, is completed and will make a good 50 barrel producer.

D. N. Griffin, No. 1, is drilling in the Gordon and at this time has a show for an increase in production.

Silas Fittro, No. 5, is drilling at 2,400 feet.

Williams & Wilson has a fishing job at 1,000 feet on Silas Fittro, No. 6.

W. L. Steele, No. 1, is down 150 feet, and No. 2, on the same farm is drilling at 500 feet.

The L. H. Griffin No. 1, will commence spudding to-day.

The W. A. Rogers, No. 1, on Rock Camp run is complete and will make only a very small producer.

G. E. West, No. 3, on Rock Camp run, has come in a very light well.

Stackpole and Horrisey are still fishing at 2,300 feet on Samuel Gain, No. 4.

Lloyd Randolph, No. 1, is at a depth of 2,500 feet.

J. H. Riffe, No. 1, is at the 2,400 mark.

F. J. Ehret, No. 1, is drilling at 300 feet.

STRIKERS ARRESTED

At Kingwood and Taken to Parkersburg to Be Tried For Alleged Violation of Injunctions.

Five miners in the Kingwood Coal Company strike were arrested Wednesday evening by United States Deputy Marshal Dan R. Jackson and taken to Parkersburg Thursday morning to answer before Judge John J. Jackson, of the federal court the charge of violating the injunctions issued by him to the Kingwood Coal Company and the Irona Coal Company, against certain striking miners and labor organizers and agitators. The injunctions were of the usual character and restrained the strikers from interfering with the property and employes of the coal companies and from assembling within a certain distance of the mines.

ELECTION NOTICE.

Take notice that on Tuesday, the 5th day of April, 1904, there will be an election held in the City of Clarksburg under chapter 101 of the act of 1897, entitled "An act to amend and re-enact and reduce into one, the several acts incorporating the town of Clarksburg in the County of Harrison, defining the powers thereof and describing the limits of said town for the election of officers and common council, provided by said act, mayor, chief of police, city clerk, superintendent of streets, commissioner of water works, collector and treasurer, city assessor and school commissioner, for one year, and five councilmen, one for each ward for two years each, as provided by said act as amended. Said election shall be held and conducted and the result thereof certified, returned and finally determined under chapter three of the Code of West Virginia as amended. Such election will be held in the places enumerated below in the respective wards by the commissioners now here named:

Second ward—Curkendall property near corner of Monticello avenue and Main street, Marsh M. Carr, William E. Smith, Roy Alexander, commissioners.

Third Ward—Walker House, J. Hornor Davis, Cecil B. Highland, Ellsworth Cook, commissioners.

Fourth ward—Ed. Armstrong's office, Dorsey R. Potter, R. Lynn Osborn, Stuart F. Reed, commissioners.

Fifth ward—Connell Chamber, Calvin P. Howell, Will E. Morris, M. G. Sperry, commissioners.
