THE Y. M. C. A. IN KOREA.

The International committee of Young Men's Christian Associations has not yet heard from their representative, P. L. Gillette, who went to Seoul, Korea, two years ago to inaugurate association work in that city and to superintend the erection of a building for the newly organized association. In securing the money for this building, which is to be erected in the heart of the city, the residents of Seoul have pledged nearly 8,000 yen. Representatives of many nations and leaders in political and religious circles, united in the common undertaking. The meeting place for the general meeting in which the organization was effected, was the building of the Seoul Street Railway Company, which was offered them by the manager. The American Ambassador presided. Count Takaki, manager of the Seoul bank, and Dr.

Brown, commander-in-chief of the Korean customs, and the most powerful man in the Korean government outside of the Emperor, made addresses in favor of the Association. There were represented in the audience the Japanese minister, a representative of the German government, the Chinese consul-general, a representative of the Russian legation, and aide of the military staff of the King, the United States consul-general, secretaries of the German and Japanese consulates, and the wives of the United States and Russian ambassadors. The men at the head of six of the legations nearly all of those engaged in the local schools, as well as the missionaries and leading business men, offered their help. A Chinese merchant gave, largely, requesting that the association make some provisions for their clerks and sons. Fletcher S. Brockman, national secretary for China, was present and gave directions to the movement. Anxiety is felt lest the present conditions in Seoul delay seriously the progress of the movement which has started so auspiciously.

There are candidates on the so-called Democratic ticket, who actually say they did not know that a Democratic convention had been held or that a Democratic ticket had been named. They went no farther than the star-chamber convention and thought the Democrats who were in it understood the plan sufficiently well not to let the alleged Democratic convention at the court house be anything else, so far as the general public was concerned, but a citizens' convention. Some way or other they slipped a cog or two and brought about the general misunderstanding with some of the candidates, who were slow to get on to themselves and say that they had actually accepted the Democratic nomination although they insisted that they were only the nominees of the alleged citizens' convention. May be the Democratic leaders, who are plotting against the Republican party and who are hungry for office finally drove them into line.

That citizens' convention that nominated a ticket, which it asks the citizens of Clarksburg to vote, was a sort of star chamber affair. There were two or three Democrats present, who are looking after office in the near future, and two others who are irregular so far as the party to which they profess to belong is concerned. It was a concocted affair to turn the county over to two or three scheming Democrats. Republicans will not lend their votes to such a plan.

It has now been established that no one is trying to buy the water works at Fairmont, the Times of that place having taken the pains to say to itself, after making the charge that the Republican ticket down there had the sale in view. The campaign thunder it thought it had struck seems to have rolled the other way and the pressure brought to bear compelled it to take water itself, but not the water works.

Having repudiated the Democratic ticket, the so-called Democratic organ invites suspicion from its own party. It ought to be slicker than that, if it desires to deceive its party any longer and

that appears to have been its main object for some time.

Will H. Cole has been a very efficient city clerk. He is thoroughly acquainted with the duties of the office. His reelection is a foregone conclusion. There is no more popular young man in the city and none who could fill the office more efficiently.


