The Democratic organ took the pains to trouble the Telegram for a list of the delegates to the Republican city convention, working the ruse that it desired to publish them as a matter of news, just as the Telegram did in reference to the Democratic convention, but after it saw how representative it was it did not have the courage to publish. Why? Because it has been told to say the next day that the convention was made up of gamblers and disreputable people. Had it published the list and then followed with such a charge, its readers would have easily seen what a misrepresentation it was making.

The main questions in the Fairmont election, according to the papers of that city, were the gas question and the proposed sale of the water works. There are no such issues here. Clarksburg has the cheapest gas rates in the world and not sixteen cents like they have at Fairmont. Again, there has not been the slightest thought of the sale of the

water works here. Why should the Clarksburg News undertake to tell the people that the issues here are the same as they were in Fairmont? Come, own up that you have misrepresented in order to deceive, or is it a case of ignorance pure and simple?

One paper says the Citizens' ticket was nominated by petition, but the head of that ticket says it was done in an office, where there were only a half dozen present and there you are. They ought to get their heads together, compare notes and see if they can not tell the same story after that. But in this instance who told the facts in the case? The Telegram is in position to say there were not more than half a dozen persons, mostly Democrats, at that star-chamber meeting that assumed to call itself the Citizens' convention and to nominate a ticket to represent the citizens of Clarksburg.

A paper in this city says about one hundred citizens signed a petition asking that so and so be nominated for city offices. The petition that went to the Democratic convention was read out, but there were not that many names on it. Besides the men that are on that ticket, that is, the fellows who happened to be on the inside 'fess up that there was what some would call a convention, held in star-chamber meeting with less than half a dozen there, not one of whom cared anything about the welfare of the city or the Republican party.

The personnel of the Democratic convention was no better than that of the Republican convention, and yet no one read any thing in the Telegram derogatory to the character of the men there. If there was half as much fair play shown by the Democratic sheet, the people might have some confidence in it and its words might have a little weight, but as it is it has neither the confidence of any one nor any weight with the people.

And no one in Clarksburg, so far as the Telegram knows, regrets the election of Kinsey as mayor of Fairmont. All who know him know him to be a good man, and it is Fairmont's business as to who is to be its mayor and not ours. Fairmonters should regard the matter in the same light and not try to run things in Clarksburg.

Having been deprived of the privilege of saying who should constitute the Citizens' ticket in Clarksburg, why should it be expected that the citizens will support it? There was something rotten in Denmark, when those few schemers put that ticket up, and the people will knock it down for them. Mark that. Paste it in your hat.

Parkersburg seems to be a Republic of its own. Here is what the State Journal says: "President Jackson to-day returned from Miami, Florida." If what the State Journal says is true and what we know of Mr. Jackson, we congratulate the city of Parkersburg for being honored with such a high executive officer.

The Democratic organ, which has repudiated its own party, possibly on ac-

count of the convention's resolutions which denounced every thing and every body on earth, undertakes to compare its favorite candidate with the mayor-elect of Fairmont. What do you think of that? He's no preacher.

There is every sign of friendliness on the part of the Republican city ticket to labor, as shown by the fact that members of that ticket belong to labor unions and believe in union principles. Where does the Democratic ticket come in in that respect? Answer. You can not.

Since the city authorities, as the Democratic organ well knows, has no jurisdiction over the bridges within the city limits, why should it try to tell its readers that the city ought to do so and so with the bridges? It is best always to confine one's self to actual situations.

The circulation of the Telegram, both daily and weekly, grows quite fast. So does its advertising patronage. Business men know a good medium through which to reach the people and the people know where to get every thing that goes on and where to get it straight.

Some one said that they are trying to circulate around the city that the alleged Democratic ticket is to run its campaign on morality. Does that not beat you? Why do they not tell about the promises they are making to both sides?

There is a doleful lack of unity on the part of the various Democratic conventions regarding the endorsement of a presidential candidate. The several Republican conventions held so far stand as one for the nomination of President Roosevelt.

The election of the Republican city ticket means decent city government. The Democratic organ does not say that the election of the other ticket does mean that, although it evasively tries to make that impression.

And so they want to start a new Republican party, but for what? Their president says the purpose is to elect a Democratic sheriff. How is that for loyal Republicanism?

Some of the same forces that tried to defeat Kinsey at Fairmont are doing their best to elect Gordon here. It may not be clear to the public mind, but it is true nevertheless.

The Democrats generally smiled when the committee put Van on the ticket for councilman in the second ward. They wondered what the committee had against him.

Still repudiating the Democratic ticket. One sheet says the Democrats who do not vote that alleged citizens' ticket are dirty stinkers. How do you like it?


