





**COMING OF  
"OTHELLO"**

For the first time in the history of the  
American stage a continuous tour has  
fallen upon Mr. Harry Leighton, of late  
years identified with the Frohman suc-  
cesses, "The Prisoner of Zenda," "Rupert  
of Hentzau," etc., and who formerly won  
distinction through his association with  
Mojeska Marie Wainwright, Louis-James,  
and the late Thomas Keene, in Shakes-  
pearean work.
