When the settlements on the Forked
Deer river were new and western Ten-
nessee was still Chickasaw country all
attempts to start religious services
were for a long time broken up by a
gang of young outlaws who drove the
ministers away. At last the Rev. Ar-
thur Davis, a muscular Christian, came.
They had given him notice that no
Methodist parson should ever preach
in Lower Forked Deer. Mr. Davis
