When Sir Henry Stanley, the intrepid explorer died at his home in London a few days ago, one of the most remarkable figures of the present age passed away. While he was the leader of important expeditions his African explorations were of the most important. Those death-defying trips, fraught with the most

terrible and dangerous experiences resulted in the opening to civilization of a dark and mysterious continent never before penetrated. Never in the history of civilization has so much been accomplished by one man in so short a time as the achievements of Stanley. He tore the mysterious veil which hid a wild and barbarous country from its fastenings and revealed the heart of the dark land to the light of day and civilization. He discovered the source of rivers, lakes and mountains and located all of the important physical features of the continent and opened a way for the development and enlightenment of the country. His work in the betterment of the natives was infinite. To Stanley may very properly be accredited the astonishing feat of completing the map of Africa, for before his work there the whole heart of the continent remained a blank space—a vast unexplored region unknown to the world—upon the maps of men. As long as there is such a thing as history so long will the name of Henry M. Stanley be remembered and immortalized.

Steeped in sin and iniquity there are some Democratic politicians who want to trump up things against their Republican brethren, so as to hide their own rottenness from the public. But they go at it in the wrong way and find that they have worsted themselves. Some of them object to men even voting, where they have a right to vote. A few prosecutions for malicious persecutions and a few heavy damage suits against them would teach them the folly of their acts and show them they had no right to attempt to use the courts of this country for furthering their vicious designs against the people and the public welfare. They are beginning to see what asses they have made of themselves but they need a few more lessons to do them any good. It is hinted that they are going to get a full dose before they get through with the job.

Because the gas companies here arranged it to cut down expenses in the operation of their system, several cities and towns in this State which are jealous of the progress and wonderful development Clarksburg has made are laboring hard to make the impression that gas rates are to be raised and extortionate prices charged hereafter. They speak without authority and without knowledge. It is understood that the rates are to remain the same and that there is to be no change in the treatment of manufacturers. Other cities and towns need not think they can keep manufactories from locating here by such misrepresentation. We are prepared to take care of all that apply at our doors and they will all be treated right. The green-eyed monster in other cities should close its eyes again and take the sleep that has known no awaking those many years. There is no opportunity to give

Clarksburg the black-eye, those places all seem bent on making it have.

The desperate Democratic ringsters have their eyes on all of the offices in the country. Their plan is to make the county Democratic and run it in the most high-handed manner, even repeating the history of Democratic rule in this county, which was the most infamous as every one knows that ever existed any where. The people should not be deceived like they were two years ago, when the party would not tell that a fragment of that same old ring was to be given the opportunity to break in. They got their eyes opened as soon as it happened and they have been keeping them open ever since.

Since the mouthing says the trusts are to be a paramount issue in this campaign, would it not do the public a favor by telling whether the attitude of the Democratic members of the United States supreme court toward the Northern Securities case is to be the principal feature of the plank in the Democratic platform on that subject. A few explanations are necessary to clear up the minds of the people on that as a paramount issue.

The Democratic paper warbles something about never sailing under false colors. The truth of the matter is it never had any colors to sail under and it would not recognize an American flag, if it were to see one. About the only flag it is thinking of these days is the one that had slavery engraved upon it, but thanks to a liberty-loving people, it will never be unfurled in this State.

The Democratic paper, which is the mouthing of a few office-hungry and unscrupulous even disreputable Democratic politicians, tries to make the impression that they are good men by saying other men are bad, but the people of the county know them and to be just what we say they are. It is a game that the News plays only to lose. It may not have found it out yet but it will depend on that.

If you still have your doubts about the Democrats having an organized Democratic ring, just watch the actions of the Democratic officeholders and you will find out. Some of them are very busy these days trying to run the politics of this county, the courts and everything and everybody, but the people do not propose to stand for it.

The Republican party has an ideal county ticket and every Republican should find it a pleasure and feel it a duty to support it. Not one word can truthfully and fairly be said against any man on the ticket and none know it better than those Democratic schemers, who are trying their level best to prejudice people against it, by calling it names.

False designs are best judged by acts. If the Democratic paper would but watch the acts of the self-appointed dictators of its party in this county, it would really find that it has been upholding some very bad things. The trouble is it is unacquainted with its party and some of the rottenness it is steeped in, but before the campaign is over those acts will be fully ventilated and the News will then see what a fool it has made of itself.

The little Democratic paper here says the tariff will be a paramount issue this campaign, while Senator Vest, the well known Democratic leader says in this week's Saturday Evening Post that the tariff question is settled for years to come. Who is the better authority? It seems a burlesque on Senator Vest to couple what he says with what the mouthing lets out on the subject, which it knows so little about.

The grand jury was literally besieged with Democratic politicians, some of them in office and others hungry for office. They hung around continually a day or so, hoping that they could use the courts of this country to further their own selfish ends, but they forget that the courts are for the purpose of justice to man and man and not to further any man's political ambitions.

Democrats should disabuse their minds of the thought that this paper is abusing Henry G. Davis. It is not abusing any one but just telling hard, cold facts, and they hurt, especially that one that asserts that the little Democratic politicians have it in their nogginns to get at Mr. Davis' barrel. It hurts them so that they howl every time reference is made to their designs upon him.

The mouthing a few days ago declared that it did not consider it its business to make Democratic platforms, and yet now it comes with the declaration that the tariff and the trusts are to form the paramount issue. But its feeble attempt to build a platform for the national Democracy will probably not be heard of in a radius, beyond that of its own narrowly-contracted eye.

Any one who has an idea that there is no Democratic court house ring will have that idea dispelled by watching around a little and seeing the actions of the select few who are trying to run the Democratic party in this county at present and even going to far as to try to run the Republican party.

There is one thing certain and that is that the Democratic party is not going to put up a saint this year old or young to run for office. They know that the people know them too well.
