**SCHOOL BOYS' VACATION.**

The public schools have closed and the school boy enters upon his summer's vacation. The summer vacation with the school boy is a period of time that is always looked forward to with the most pleasant anticipations. The end of the school year marks the time when he relaxes the studies he has been pursuing for nine long months for a time of rest and recreation and if there is any one who can heartily enjoy himself during his vacation it is the school boy.

Of course the school vacation is a

necessity. All work and no play makes Jack a dull boy and there should be a reasonable time for the school boy to get his mind from his school work and look about towards the other things of life. This span of recreation and enjoyment freshens the young body and mind and when the time comes again for a resumption of studies the boy is better fitted both spiritually and mentally to take them up. He can accomplish more results in his studies during the succeeding school year. He gets a chance to see and enjoy the practical side of life after a long and hard tussle with theories.

Yet should the school boy give himself to an absolute abandonment of everything and pass the school vacation in pure leisure and idleness? Of course there are circumstances which alter cases and it is largely due to these circumstances whatever they may be that the school boy should govern his vacation time. There are some things which the boys must give up. He should not pass his time in absolute idleness. There are opportunities for him to improve himself in vacation as well as out of vacation. By this is not meant that the boy must emerge from one long labor to plunge headlong into another without giving himself the necessary recreation during the summer months which his spirit and body must have. Opportunities come to all but they do not come suddenly and by chance, at least not the opportunities that can properly be called opportunities to the young man himself. There must of a necessity be some preparation and experience to cultivate these opportunities when they do arise, else they cannot be called opportunities, but things which pass above and beyond the reach of all.

The boy who gets out his fishing tackle and other paraphernalia and spends his time in enjoying himself in that way and in other similar idleness does not spend his vacation properly. Now, it must not be understood that fishing is to be tabooed altogether. The boy must do something in the summer time. But it must be something that he can be benefitted and developed by along with his recreation. Unless there be some continual intellectual improvement in enjoyment the young man will not be able to enjoy his pleasures in the higher appreciation which he should.

The boy could take a few minutes of his vacation day to read a newspaper and become acquainted with the run of current events which are making history which he does not find in the history text books he has in school. This does not detract the vacation recreation. In going riding or fishing, or hunting or picnicking he can look over the topography of the country and note its beauties and physical lines. So much can he study geography even while enjoying himself. He can take up a course of physical culture, that is in his own way. He can develop his muscles and improve himself physically while at the same time having his fun. Such is another way of improving his knowledge of anatomy and physiology. We might go on and enumerate a hundred other ways in which the boy could profit in his enjoyment a great deal higher, in the more advanced lines of knowledge than in the fundamental ones here noted.

**MAP SHOWING OUR LOCATION.**

The Telegram has the pleasure of and takes pride in publishing another page a map drawn by S. F. Reed, of this city, showing especially the advantageous location of Clarksburg from the standpoint of railroad facilities and its ready access to the big waters. A casual study of this map shows some of the many avenues through which to get the products of Clarksburg to market. There is Pittsburg not very far distant on the north with not only its home consumption but also its nearness to Cleveland and the great lake trade. On the east we find Baltimore less than 300 miles away, with Washington between and there the Atlantic ocean is practically reached, across which are taken our products in large quantities. Drop down on the map a little and we find hope of soon getting direct railroad route to the seaboard, which will give additional facilities in that direction and more than likely cause a greater cheapness in transportation of our products in that direction. Then looking southward, we find a direct line to the capitol of the state almost completed and practically a trunk line across the state from

north to south is ours. From the capitol there are facilities for the purpose of reaching other points far and near. On the west we have a trunk line leading to the Ohio river, where boat may be had, and to the great city of the central west, Cincinnati, from which radiate some of the great railway lines of the country, and by which the Ohio river flows. Again, over the Short Line, we readily and swiftly reach the great lakes, again by way of Toledo. All the points named have an important bearing on our commercial and industrial and agricultural conditions. The objective point in particular to the farmer is Baltimore, and we might add, Philadelphia and New York on the other side. They send their cattle there, their sheep, their hogs, their horses, their surplus products in general. It is also an important point to merchants, who get their stocks of goods from that place and those just east, which have been mentioned. Pittsburg also holds a like place with the merchants and farmers, stock breeders and so on. These points are also important markets for manufactured goods and coal and oil.

The great lakes are especially a fine outlet for our mineral products and manufactured articles. Then there is the Ohio river, down which we float our products to the gulf. On the west we have also Cincinnati nearby, then St. Louis and Chicago. Those cities take many of our products, and we obtain from them things we have not here.

The map is timely as there are many who do not really fully appreciate our location, and it is a good thing to lay before the manufacturers of other cities that they may learn and understand the inducements we have to offer.

One of the men who are accredited with writing some of the stuff that appears in the Herald about reform made a trip to a Cain street house Friday night of last week.
