MASSES FOR ROOSEVELT.

The Democratic New York World takes the position that the masses are with President Roosevelt and on the verge of his nomination that paper comes out with his praises. It says of him that it predicted last November his nomination by acclamation, and adds:

"It deserves to be said that the President undoubtedly represents the great body of Republican voters far better than does anybody else. It was because the Republican masses admired him and trusted him that the disgruntled senators and the disappointed Wall street men could make no headway against him."

And then, speaking in advance for the Republican national convention, that paper says:

"A convention meeting under these conditions cannot be expected to be wildly enthusiastic. But a settled, sane purpose is better than a hurrah for wearing purposes in a campaign, and there is no doubt that a like in its ticket and platform the Chicago convention will accurately represent the predominant Republican conviction and purpose, and will open a campaign that will test to the utmost the wisdom and energy of the Democrats."

The World is honest with itself and its readers, and, not like local partisan Democrats who see nothing good in anything that they have not to do with and who stand ready to condemn those who do things deserving, because they themselves have not a hand in it.

Again, when great metropolitan Democratic papers so soon in the campaign recognize the strength of the Republican nominee, it is a safe guide to what they believe the results will be. Also it may be said of the World that it has made this declaration honestly in the hope of stimulating the Democracy to a hard fight, but while it does that it confesses that the chances for Democratic success this year are hopeless.

This declaration by the World that the masses are with Roosevelt follows close that of the Telegram of the same sort. It also shows like the Telegram that the claim of the News that Roosevelt is a plutocrat is false and that the government is not a plutocracy. It is now up to the News to tell the great New York World that it lies.

OUR GOVERNMENT IN SAFE HANDS

The Louisiana Purchase Exposition Company has paid its first installment on the \$4,000,000 mortgage loan made by the United States government. It amounted to \$195,067.04 and was in accordance with the law regarding the loan. Thus, it seems that the World's Fair will be a financial success after all, notwithstanding the various rumors circulated that there would not be enough money at hand to meet the payment on the government loan. Secretary Shaw made a little kick a few days ago—it was not really a kick, but a little suggestive hint—that if the payment was not forthcoming on the dot that the government would be forced to take charge of the fair and run it itself. This was entirely proper on the part of the secretary of the treasury and not any unbecoming for act, as many seemed to think at the time. This great government of ours is run strictly upon business principles. When a debt is due the government it is not merely the privilege of the government officials to collect it, but their duty. It is a duty very clear and obvious, whether it be a World's Fair loan or anything else. The

secretary was merely doing his duty as the law sets it down. Of course, it is all right now, but it is very gratifying to the citizen to be reminded that the government is conducted upon safe business principles and by able and competent officials.

Bryan says hypocrisy is the keynote of the Democratic campaign from the Parker standpoint, and yet the majority of the delegates from West Virginia, just after the convention that nominated them, were heralded by the Democratic press of this state as mostly Parker delegates. The New York Journal, which has been authority for years among Democrats of this state especially around and in Clarksburg gives prominence to this declaration by Mr. Bryan, and thus emphasizes its significance. The Democracy of West Virginia is not forgotten in connection with its advocacy and belief in Mr. Bryan. The old war horses in this county will be remembered as stamping the county for him. They believed in him and they said they believed in his principles. He has not changed attitude. They have if they cannot accept his opinion of them. It is their idol of eight years and more that tells them they are hypocritical. If they believed in him once, why not believe in him now and confess their iniquities and inconsistencies?

It is not essential for this paper to tell once more that those who appear at the mast-head of the Telegram as its editors are in reality the editors, and that no contributions are admitted to our editorial columns, but that the News may be satisfied we tell it again. We do not want that sheet to keep in a frenzy all the year about such a little matter as contributions, anyway. So you need worry no more, but give your massive mind to something else, and yet we do not care one copper how much or how little you may think of us, nor how often or not at all. Every time we think of you it is in pity.

So contracted is the circulation of one of the Democratic clique organs here that it became necessary to resort to posters to let the people know district conventions would be held. Their other organ might have helped them out some, but since they take it to heart so that the fact has been made known that the other sheet is being run in the interest of that clique, they fear to put any notice in it, as that would be an additional proof of the collusion that has been formed.

The News, brought to time on the Cushing affair, owns up like a little man to the fact that the Prohibition speaker did say there was corruption in the Democratic party. This is not the only instance this campaign where it has been forced to own up to its deception and falsehoods. Nor will it be the last time if it continues to make such wild statements as it has in the past. It will be well prodded all along during the campaign, and by the time it gets through it will think a pitchfork was after it.

It is perceptible of late that some of the Democratic candidates are not staying in the city so much as formerly. It is found out what the clique is up to. Doubtless, some of them have found out by this time that the axe is to drop on their heads and have gone home giving it up. Still others likely have the assurance that something may fall their way, if it be the disposition of the clique, and they have gone home to await the keeping of the pledge or to be turned down.

So hard pressed are they on the subject of having things all-fixed up, that it may be they have resorted to the poster plan to divert attention from the matter and to make a pretense at wanting the people to choose the nominees, but that sham does not cover the fact that they desire the party to ratify the slate.

Fearful that there is no interest in Democracy this year, posters have been resorted to to get the claque gathered. It is a confession that the clique has awakened to the fact that this is a Republican year and in their desperation resort to this to make the best showing possible in the beginning of the campaign.

The clique organ intimates strongly that the reason the Democratic party is going to nominate Henry G. Davis is because he is Senator Elkins' father-in-law and they expect Uncle Steve to help elect him. What fools they make of themselves, not on occasions, but always.

The Telegram seems to have driven them from cover, since they now try to meet the declaration by this paper with the process of announcing that they want the party to choose the nominees—but it is all a sham, it does not matter what the posters say.

IS TO-BARREL WELL.

In the Salem district, in this county the Star Oil Company has completed its test well on the Evaline Thompson farm and has a show for a 10-barrel pumpjet in the Big Injun sand.

On the Wallace side of the Folsom district, in this county, the Deimar Oil Company has completed No. 4 on the W. E. Bennett and No. 3 on the Lloyd Lyons farms, the first good for 15 and the last 45 barrels a day.

In the same district, the South Penn Oil Company's No. 4 on the C. E. Robinson farm and No. 5 on the M. P. Dye farms are holding up at 125 and 175 barrels a day, respectively.

On Kinchelo creek, Lewis county, the Crude Oil Company has drilled its test well on the L. E. Gall farm into the fifth sand and has a show for a 40 or 50-barrel producer. In the Folsom district, Wetzel county, the South Penn Oil Company's No. 51 on the Genie Robinson farm got the pay in the Gordon sand and produced 75 barrels the first seven hours.
