DILLINGHAM COMPANY OPENS WITH BIG PARADE

Col. Frank A. Dillingham, the great advertiser and philanthropist, opens his series of entertainments tonight on the vacant lot opposite the postoffice. The parade through the streets of the city has usually aroused a great deal of comment and in all probability a great many people will turn out to witness the affair. Col. Dillingham's opening lecture will be given tonight. Admission to both lecture and entertainment is always free and an enormous crowd is expected on the grounds. Col. Dillingham's reputation as an eloquent orator, magnetic entertainer is well known. It is understood that at his opening lecture at Charleston over 3,500 people were present. Clarksburg people have an opportunity of hearing the talented colonel for the first time and he is able to judge whether his reputation has been fairly earned. Gen. E. L. Boggs, Gov. White's private secretary, was talking in the lobby of the hotel yesterday and, in speaking of Col. Dillingham said: "You people down here certainly have a surprise in store for you when Col. Dillingham reaches town. He is the warmest proposition I have ever seen. In the first place, the very way he can speak is worth going a long distance to hear as he is the most naturally eloquent and magnetic man before an audience I have ever listened to. His advertising methods are original with him and from the moment he reaches a city until he leaves he has everybody on the jump. I saw him in Charleston last month and I want to tell you he had that town stirred up. And as for money, a ten-dollar bill don't seem to look any bigger to him than a dime does to the ordinary individual. While he takes in a great deal of money from the sale of his medicine while in a city, I doubt very much whether he leaves much better off than when he came, as when he can't find some way of giving his money away he will buy hundreds of dollars' worth of food for the poor."
