**NEWS' FOOLISH TALK.**

Some of the Democratic papers have been saying much off and on about what a fine judge the Honorable Judge Mason is and how well he deals out justice. The Telegram does not take issue with them in that respect, but, when the News uses these words in connection with a sentence imposed by him for what it terms a cold-blooded murder, "there languishes behind the bars of the penitentiary an individual serving a minimum sentence, because the ability of the state didn't prove that a murder was committed in the first degree," the public knows that its good opinion of Judge Mason and his official acts is only

professed and is full of insincerity. Now, mark you, that sheet says it was a minimum sentence. The state did not fix the sentence, but the court did. Who is here censured by the News? Judge Mason most assuredly. He did not have to give a minimum sentence, if such it was. Again, they talk about the state's ability to prove murder in the first degree. Every one knows that there was ponderous testimony such as it was and that all who saw it were on the witness stand. They were all sworn to tell all they knew and the case was vigorously prosecuted. If all was not learned about it, it was not the fault of the court, and, if the News and the Democratic clique knew more than was brought out, it was their duty as good citizens and those who love justice to aid the state and not to protect a criminal. In this connection the News is also challenged to produce evidence that will substantiate its remarks. Perhaps, when it gets through, since it is so wise, it will have actually demonstrated the fact that there are some criminals at large, who failed, when the court was doing its utmost to punish the guilty, tried to protect them. Tell us all you know about this case that has not been told and the public may then judge for itself, who should be censured, and, if you know things that were not brought out, it is but right that the public should give you the censure you deserve.

**UNJUST TO BOTH.**

In speaking of the office of prosecuting attorney of this county the News uses these words:

"The office of prosecuting attorney, the most important in the county, is again, if they succeed in election, to be placed in the hands of one who is not able to handle it and only means more freed criminals, as he would not be permitted to convict them if there was a show out of it."

And only a few days before it made this remarkable utterance, it said in writing about E. D. Lewis the Democratic nominee for that office:

"He has a young man studying law under his tutorage in the person of Will E. Morris, who is said to be a very apt student and is the nominee for the office of prosecuting attorney on the Republican ticket."

These unwarranted attacks on Mr. Morris call for a true statement of the matter. Mr. Morris graduated at the law school at the university and was admitted to practice here. The law office and books of Lewis C. Lawson, who has moved to another state and began the practice of law were purchased. Mr. Lewis formed a partnership with Mr. Morris. They are partners practicing law and do not stand related as tutor and pupil, as Mr. Lewis himself will tell you. Now, since Lewis has sufficient confidence in Morris' ability and knowledge to form a partnership with him, is it not plain that he regards him highly and that Morris is worthy of the office he seeks? Just as much so as Lewis. This being so the News must apply its remarks to the one as much as the other, and when it comes down to the true situation, the Telegram believes either gentleman deplors and discommences such disparaging remarks of either, as they both have the very highest esteem for one another. The News would do well to pursue some other course in this respect.

Wonder why the News did not tell about the raiding of a speakery at What Next. Doubtless, it was because the officers, who had been given the necessary papers raided the place and brought two men to jail. It could not chronicle that on one page for fear it would show the people the falsity of its editorial on the subject.
