GONE HOME

Malissa C. Teter was born January 12, 1837, died August 6th, 1904.

The deceased was united in marriage November 2, 1854, to Sylvester Teter, who survives her. To this union were born nine children, four sons and five daughters. She leaves one son, B. C. Teter and four daughters, Miss Maggie Teter, Mrs. Pattie L. Marsh, Mrs. Delise Morrison and Mrs. Adeline Fleming to mourn her loss. She professed religion and joined the M. P. church at the age of 14 years and lived a devoted member till called to her reward, for which she so faithfully labored.

This is the history of a true, noble woman briefly told. Her life was full of noble Christian deeds. It can truthfully be said of her, "She hath done what she could."
