SUCCESSFUL

Was the Farmers' Institute Recently Held at Lost Creek—Official Report of Secretary.

S. A. Elliott, of McAlpin, late secretary of the Farmers' Institute for Harrison county, contributes to the Telegram the following official report of the institute recently held at Lost Creek, which will prove quite interesting to the numerous readers of this paper:

The Harrison County Farmers' Institute convened at Lost Creek August 15 and 16, 1904. When the speakers sent by the board arrived they were met by the farmers in buggies to convey them from the train to their homes for shelter and refreshment, and as the people gathered from a distance in the country the good citizens of Lost Creek took charge of them and their beasts. On the previous Sabbath the preacher in charge of the M. P. church had announced that the institute would be held in the church. Upon entering the house it was easy to believe that all necessary arrangements had been made; with table decorated with flowers for the secretary, suitable chair for the president, the choir seated at the organ at the service of the president. The session was opened by singing. On account of the absence of the preacher in charge caused by the death of a good old brother, prayer was offered by Bro. Smith, one of the pillars in the church. President Short then arose and briefly stated the object of a farmers' institute. The secretary stated why the institute was there this year, and also spoke of the effort made to make it a success. After G. C. Starcher, of the Agricultural College, at Morgantown, asked the question "Is the Institute Welcome Here?" J. E. Smith in response said in a few well chosen words, "yes, you are welcome, thrice welcome," which made all feet at home, engaged in one great common cause, the promotion of the farmers' institute.

The different subjects on the program for the afternoon session were discussed by persons to whom assigned, viz: Hon. F. L. Allen, of Ohio; C. H. Davidson, Thomas Kinsley, G. A. Nuzum and others. At 5 p. m. adjourned to 7.00.

Evening session opened with music by the choir. Promptly the program was taken up and the various subjects discussed by F. H. Smith, C. A. Short, John Lowe, Hon. F. L. Allen, S. A. Elliott, Thomas Kinsley, Thomas Hornor, Prof. Ludwig, C. W. Davison and others.

Tuesday morning followed by prayer by F. L. Allen, of Ohio. The question box being passed around, when opened was found to contain many very important questions along the line of the institute program, and when answered brought forth many important thoughts which caused quite an interesting discussion on different questions participated in by P. I. Lynch, G. W. Southern, Fred Smith, Earl W. Sheets, Mrs. Curry, Milton Mearns, P. W. Post and others. G. W. Southern then gave an interesting talk on planting and care of fruit trees, exhibiting at the same time a basket of fruits of various kinds and best varieties. G. A. Nuzum then took up the subject, "The Most Profitable Dairy Cow," and showed that the Jersey was the ideal cow for dairy.

Afternoon Session.
 For next year C. W. Davison, of Lost Creek, was elected president; S. A. Elliott, vice president, Bridgeport; Earl W. Sheets, secretary, West Milford, and G. A. Nuzum, assistant secretary, Bridgeport. A well written paper was read by John Lowe on the subject "The Professional and Practical Farmer." F. L. Allen made an able talk on the cultivation of soils. G. C. Starcher explained in an able speech what the college of agriculture offers to young farmers. A paper on the subject "Be It Profitable For Farmers to Use International Stock Food," written by L. D. Swisher, now a resident of Michigan, but former resident of Lost Creek, was read by Fred Smith. "Should the Farmer Be Backward to Chain His Rights?" was discussed by Fred Smith and others. S. A. Elliott read a paper entitled "The Farmer, the Coming Man of America."

By actual count there were present at the first session 76 persons, at the night session 167, at Tuesday morning session 86, at evening session 101, 80 of whom were ladies, making an average at each session of 130.

At 5 p. m., the program being exhausted, after a few touching remarks of appreciation by the president and secretary to the people, and a few well chosen responsive words by Fred Smith, after a song by the choir and benediction by Rev. Queen, closed one of the most interesting farmers' institutes ever held in Harrison county.




