

OIL NEWS

On the east side of the Folsom district, in this county, the South Penn Co.'s No. 8 on the T. J. Parish farm has slumped and it now produces 162 barrels a day. When drilled in a little more than a week ago this well started to flow at the rate of 30 barrels an hour and placed 685 barrels to its credit the first twenty-four hours. In the same district the South Penn Company's No. 2, on the Jesse Ashcraft farm, is holding up at 110 barrels a day.

In the Salem district, this county Davison & Smith have drilled their test of the Davison-Smith farm through the strays, and have developed no oil or gas.

On the east side of the Folsom creek the South Penn has drilled its test on the S. S. Shriver farm into the Gordon 10 feet and are fishing. The same company has drilled its No. 11 on the G. W. Talkington farm into the top of the Gordon and has developed no oil or gas No. 12 on the same farm is 15 feet in the Gordon and has developed sound gas, but no oil. The No. 7 on the T. J. Parish farm is six feet in the Gordon and as found no oil or gas.

The South Penn has drilled No. 20 on the I. D. Morgan farm through the Gordon and will have a 25-barrel producer. The same company has completed its second test on the Perry Hall farm and will give it a shot.

Republican Senatorial Convention.
To the Republicans of the Twelfth Senatorial District:
In obedience to the rules governing the proceedings of the Republican party, the Republican Senatorial Committee for the Twelfth Senatorial District, of West Virginia, directs that a District Senatorial Convention of delegated representatives of the Republican party, be held at the City of Clarksburg, at the park pavilion, at 1 o'clock p. m., on the 12th day of September, 1904, for the following purposes:
First. To nominate a candidate for State Senator for the Twelfth Senatorial District.
Second. To appoint a Senatorial Committee for said district.
Third. To transact any other business properly coming before said body.
Said district consists of the counties, Doddridge, Harrison and Lewis, and each county shall be entitled to one vote in said convention for each 150 votes or fraction of more than 75 votes, cast for William McKinley in 1900, to wit:

Votes for McKinley, 1900.	
Doddridge	1893
Harrison	3918
Lewis	1973

The delegates or their representatives regularly appointed for each of said counties shall be entitled to seats in the convention.
