**MILITIA IS HOME**

From the Army Maneuvers at Manassas With Others Under General Bell They Carried Off the Honors.

Company K, of the First regiment of the West Virginia National Guards, arrived home at 8:10 o'clock Monday morning from Manassas, Va., where they took part in the army maneuvers under command of Generals Grant and Bell, of the United States army. They were under command of R. L. Osborn, captain of the company, and all seemed but little worse for the trip, although they showed some fatigue from the long ride. They left Manassas Sunday afternoon at 3:00 o'clock and came on a special with other troops to Grafton, at which point they were transferred to the morning accommodation. The company was located at Thoroughfare Gap and was under command of General Bell forming a part of the Browns army, which won the four battles fought. They were engaged in battle four days and were called out at various hours during the night. There was a great deal of hard work attached to the maneuvers but the experience was well worth it and now they feel that they are real soldiers. Returning the company numbered, including officers, fifty-three men.
