SUCCESSFUL OPENING

Of the Season at the Y. M. C. A. Was Sunday—Dr. Peters Makes Able Address—Program Was Fine.

The season's opening of meetings for men at the local Y. M. C. A. was a decided success, both from the numbers attending and from the deep spirit of interest shown. The first meeting began at three o'clock when A. K. Thorn, chairman of the religious department, opened up the "Yoke Fellows" meeting, at which there were nearly twenty young men. The significance of this body of men is remarkable when we think that these are the men upon whom devolves the support of the men's meeting for the season. After a brief prayer and the conference of "Yoke Fellows" and conference the "Yoke Fellows" took up their places in the 3:30 men's meeting. This meeting is for the public generally, and the meeting of Sunday was especially helpful. After a brief song service, led by Miss Ridgely, participated in by Miss Ridgely, instructor at Broadus College in music, whose rendition of the soprano solo was received with great appreciation. The Y. M. C. A. quartette, with their rendering of two numbers added much to the spirit and power of the meeting.

The address given by Rev. L. E. Peters proved him to be a man well versed in the association life and activities. In a brief but forceful way he covered the entire field of association work, putting proper emphasis upon the high aims and deep purposes of the Y. M. C. A. in that it reaches out for the entire man, and through its physical, social and intellectual attractions, it leads the young man to put his all, his entire manhood in the service of Christ, the Savior.

Secretary Mayhew introduced a new plan Sunday which judging from its hearty reception on the part of those present, it will be a means of much good in reaching the lives of men. This new departure was the holding of a conversational Bible class, immediately following the men's meeting, to which all men are cordially invited, especially those who have been particularly touched by the message of the day. The class is called conversational because it is taking for its course the Conversations of Christ, and second, because the class is held in this conversational way and the hearty response with which the men answered the queries and questions of the secretary proves that it is a most powerful method.

Next Sunday will be the day for the enrollment in Bible classes and the Y. M. C. A. is anxious to have a large enrollment one which will be almost one-third of the entire membership. The Bible study this year will be done in groups; these groups will be as far as possible, naturally formed groups, where all will feel free to enter heartily into the Bible study.

AWFUL SLAUGHTER
