That lady lowered her opinion of him as soon

as she received his letter and does not hesitate to openly express her disgust at such a man.

Blair is one of the "has-beens." None are afraid of him. He is not in any better standing with the Democracy of his own county than he should be and belongs to the crowd that has been repudiated several times on account of their rotten political methods and their highhanded manner in not only running the county but in trying to run other people's business—private at that. As the result Blair will not carry his party vote in Doddridge county and there is no good reason that he will do it in either of the other two counties that comprise the district.
