**FIRST XMAS SERMON**

Preached By Rev. Laughlin, Ministerial Student at Broadus, To Wilsonburg Congregation.

Rev. G. G. Laughlin preached Saturday and Sunday at Wilsonburg. Sunday morning he preached his first Christmas sermon. The theme was "Heaven's Gift" from the text, "The gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord." By way of introduction the speaker said, "There are a few days during the year that we cherish and esteem above the rest. The first, New Year's day, a time which calls forth thankfulness and praise as we look back at the blessings of the past—then look into the untold days before us and ask the Father's blessing to till be extended toward us. Then a few weeks later we come to a day to which we love to pay some tribute of respect—the birthday of America's first great executive February 22. Then a little over two months more we reach a day which calls forth very sacred memories as our people assemble in the family graveyards and cemeteries and there on those little mounds pay tributes of respect to their noble dead—Decoration Day. Then about five weeks later we come to a day where rich and poor alike can join in hoisting the stars and stripes in commemoration of the birthday of American liberty—July 4. "Then on through some of these months we come to another day which is very dear to us, our own birthday. "Then coming to the last week in November in accordance to the proclamation of president and governor, we all join in the annual Thanksgiving Day. And last, we come to a day, the 25th of December, which has been revered down through over nineteen hundred years and will continue to be revered until time is no more, because it is the birthday of our blessed Lord, a day which every other day of the three hundred and sixty-five." The speaker then spoke of the purpose of gift giving and why this "great gift" was given. Among other things he said, "The poor cannot enjoy very costly gifts, some enjoy none at all, but the gift of the text is free and can be enjoyed by rich and poor alike."
