HID STAMP AND IS JAILED

Lord Byron Morrison was arrested Monday evening and taken before United States Commissioner Thomas S. Spates by United States Deputy Marshal E. D. Hupp. Morrison is charged with violating the internal revenue law at his speakeasy at Bristol, which he has conducted for some time. The specific charge is that he did not keep his government stamp in public view. It is charged that to avoid arrest by the state authorities he employed Tom, Dick and Harry to run the place and kept the stamp concealed that the state authorities might not discover that it was actually his place and that he was authorized by the federal government to run a place there, subject, of course, to the sanction of the state. He waived examination, and, in default of bond of \$200 was sent to jail.

CONVICTS SENTENCED TO THE PENITENTIARY

Just before circuit court adjourned for the day Monday, Judge C. W. Lynch sentenced Tom Williams to the penitentiary for five years for burglary, and William Harris alias Shorty, to one year in that institution. Williams was convicted of breaking into Newton Conley's hen house and stealing chickens. Harris stabbed an Italian but did not inflict a fatal wound.
