WOMEN'S WEAR IN WARTIME

Homemade Cloth of Many Kinds.

Scraped Horn For Hats. We had one cotton mill to spin the warp. The people stood in line to get a bunch of cotton for warp. The filling was yarn, cotton, flax and tow. We got our dyestuff from the forest. It was almost as bad on timber as the tanbark trade is now. There was great rivalry among the women to see who could have the prettiest dress. I have a quilt made of cotton and linen called a "Confederate" quilt. The clothing for every member of the family was made from the raw material, carded, spun, woven, dyed and made with homespun thread. The tow linen cloth had one peculiar feature. It was a great stretcher. It was often exchanged for other things. A man and his wife started to town with cloth sufficient to get some articles. On the way he remembered he needed a girdle also. He told his wife. They decided to tie the ends of the cloth to two saplings, tie to stretch a girdle out of it. I took great interest in the silk industry. We feel the worms on mulberry leaves, and such beautiful silk we did have. A bright stripe in a cotton dress made it very fine. A family made gloves, beautiful milk mitts, with bees embroidered on the back. Nothing went to waste. The three trees furnished us pins and hairpins. Our millinery was our crowning effort. Hats were made of cotton thread checked, put on a block, stretched very stiff and ironed, then wired. We had homemade flowers and all kinds of material for trimming. A cloth frame made stiff and covered with scraped cow's horn was much admired, if it did look like a coconut cake.—Charlotte (N. C.) Observer.

QUIETNESS OF MANNER.

All pretension is abhorrent to her as being the hallmark of shallowness and superficiality. She wins her way and holds it over by the exercise of a courtesy and a tact which rarely jostle feelings or awaken prejudice.

TREATMENT OF COLIC.

What to Do to Bring Relief to the Suffering Babe.

The signs of colic are a sharp, hard cry, causing the face to become red, sometimes almost blue, according to the severity of the pain. During these paroxysms the child refuses to be comforted. The abdomen is distended and tense, the little legs are drawn up against the abdomen, and the child is only relieved by getting rid of the gases formed. Hot liquids taken into the stomach or administered by intestinal injection are usually very effectual. Gin, brandy or any stimulant containing alcohol, teas from herbs, injections containing medication—these I do not advise the mother to give without a physician's advice. Pure hot water can, however, be safely given and usually with good effect, soon causing relief at any rate. First try what can be done by giving the child hot water through the mouth. Several teaspoonfuls of very hot water given by a dropper will almost surely bring up quantities of wind, and the child will fall asleep from the relief it affords. Pick up the child and placing him over your shoulder or laying him across the lap on his stomach and gently patting the back, in conjunction with the hot water given, will effectually relieve the pain.—Marianna Wheeler in Harper's Bazar.

CULINARY CONCEITS.

Ice water used with the yolks of eggs makes an omelette more tender. Fried cakes made with brown sugar will keep moist longer than when made with white sugar.

Never wash raisins that are to be used in sweet dishes. It will make the pudding or cake heavy.

Roll nuts or fruit in flour before adding to the other ingredients in making a cake. This will prevent them from sinking to the bottom.

A tiny bit of cinnamon added to the milk when boiling will give a delicious flavor to scones or biscuits. Care should be taken, however, if stick cinnamon is used, to remove it before serving.

The golden rule in cooking salt or smoked fish is this—never boil; just simmer. Boiling has a tendency to make the fish hard, and it also destroys the flavor as well as making the fish darker. Do not boil. Just simmer.

Children and Sugar.

Children have an appetite for sugar because they need sugar. Nature cries out for it with an insistence proportioned to its necessities. It has made weakly, puny children strong and robust by satisfying what appeared to the mother to be a morbid craving. It furnishes the needed carbohydrate material to organisms that have as yet little or no power to digest starch; thus milk sugar is a part of the natural food of the infant. Sugar by the lump or pure candy is better for the child when at play, but it would be well to serve all cereals without sugar. Sugar does not mix well hygienically with anything. It is not the fault of the sugar, but of the combination. Sugar should be used very sparingly by one who has a torpid liver and not at all by one afflicted with diabetes.

Milk For Health and Beauty.

To use "milk for health" it must be taken internally; "for beauty," externally. Milk should be slipped or taken slowly. Add a little lime-water, as that makes it more digestible. About a teaspoonful to a glass of milk is the correct proportion. To prepare lime-water, pour one pint of boiling water slowly over a pint of muslin or quick lime about as large as a hen's egg. When cold, pour off and bottle and use as needed, or you may buy lime-water at a chemist's. If you want to give the face and hands an occasional milk bath, use warm milk at night and let it dry. Wash off with warm water in the morning.

Keep Your Head Back.

Pushing forward of the head will in time cause a prominence of one of the vertebrae of the spinal column, and an ugly little knob just below the nape of the neck is the result. Later fat may settle around this knob and a little excision is thus often seen on the back of an otherwise beautiful neck.
