## BLAIR CONFIRMS REPORT OF SALE

Fairmont, W. Va., Nov. 9.—Col. J. T. Blair, of Parkersburg, president of the Buckhannon and Northern Railroad Company, is a business visitor in the city. He is here in connection with the details of closing up the deal with the Pittsburgh & Lake Erie for the B. & N. holdings.

Mr. Blair says: "Well, all I can say is that the deal between the B. & N. and the P. & L. E. is closed, the deeds having passed last Thursday in New York City." When asked about the \$2,000,000 cash payment made by Col. Schoonmaker Mr. Blair said: "That is a little too large. The initial cash in hand payment made by Col. Schoonmaker was \$1,500,000."

Mr. Blair was asked what he thought about the P. & L. E. dividing the holdings with the Pennsylvania. "I do not know about that," he said, "all I know is that the P. & L. E. is the sole owner at this time and the deal was engineered wholly by the P. & L. E. people."

"What about the last injunction of Mr. Jones, gotten from the Athens judge?" "Well, I don't know about that, I think the deal was closed several days before notice was served on any of the parties connected with the deal. I know it was served on Mr. Ramsey four or five days after everything was settled and I think he was the only one they ever did get to serve the notice on, so it will not likely amount to much."

Mr. Blair said he could not speak authoritatively but he firmly believed the purchasers would build the line as originally planned by the B. & N. Mr. Blair said he did not know the plans of either the P. & L. E. people or Mr. Ramsey, as they had given out nothing as yet concerning their future action.

## CHINESE RULERS TO BE OVERTHROWN

Victoria, B. C., Nov. 9.—Telegrams from Peking to Japanese papers say movements to overthrow the present Chinese dynasty are developing with incredible rapidity. On Oct. 16, a portion of Peking was closed. Foreigners were allowed to pass the guarded gates but natives were closely scrutinized. Great activity of revolutionaries is reported from several sections. A Shanghai paper says a panic exists at Tientsin among the native servants, many of whom are leaving foreign employ owing to the trouble that is expected.

Advices from Peking published by Japanese vernacular papers received by the Empress of China state that when the Empress Dowager of China, returned hastily from her summer palace because of the bomb outrage at Peking, she summoned the Emperor and asked what he knew of the outrage whereupon the Emperor showed much confusion. At a signal from the Empress a party of guards appeared and led the Emperor to a hall where he has been since confined, no one having access to him and food being thrust in through a window. The Hochi Shimbun says the Emperor occasionally raises shrieks like those of a lunatic.
