THE EVIL EYE

Whenever I have heard people railing at the vast fortunes of some of the California millionaires, says an English writer, I have always replied that no man became a millionaire in the early history of California who had not earned his fortune by the risks he had had the courage to face. Linens Make Rice Paper.
The rice plant contributes nothing toward the manufacture of rice cigarette papers but the name. Rice paper as bought by the cigarette merchants of Egypt and Turkey is made from only perfectly new trimmings of linen and mostly comes from English and French mills in Constantinople, Famen and France. The celebrated Chinese rice paper is made from thin slices of the pith from the canes of a tree about five feet high. A sharp knife pares the pith into cylinders of uniform thickness, which are then unrolled and pressed out into so called rice paper. By the way, Egyptian cigarettes contain no Egyptian tobacco, for since 1890 the cultivation of the tobacco plant has been prohibited. It is for workmanship and the curing of the leaf that the Cairenes are so justly celebrated, but the tobacco they import comes entirely from Turkey.

Alabama's State Flag.
Over the historic capital at Montgomery waves the national flag, but the Alabama flag, and not one Alabamian in a thousand would recognize it if he saw it elsewhere than on the capitol. The flag in question has no history woven into it, for it was not adopted until 1895. It presents a St. Andrew's cross in crimson on a white field. Such a cross is shaped like a letter X, and the books suggest that the apostle Andrew died on a cross of that design. Few if any other states indulge in flags of their own. A flag is the symbol of sovereignty, and state sovereignty is limited by the federal constitution. When we were a part of Georgia we granted to the federal government the executive power of punishing treason, and if any one becomes a traitor to the Alabama flag we might have to call in the federal government in order to punish him.—Birmingham Age-Herald.

The Tongues of the Balkans.
Too many languages are spoken in the Balkans. A traveler in that region writes of the babel: "Turkish, Bulgarian, Serbo-Croatian, Roumanian, Armenian, Greek, Albanian, Kuzko-Walachenian, Chinese, the language of the gypsies; Spanish, the language of the Jews of Spanish or Portuguese descent, and the language spoken by the German, Austrian, Roumanian and Russian Jews. Add to this Arabic, Persian and Syrian, largely spoken in Constantinople; Italian, on the northeast coast of the Adriatic; Russian, in the northeastern parts of Roumania; and Austro-Hungarian, Slovenian, and the Caucasian languages of the Circassians and Georgians." Not one of these languages is of common use.

The Lone Star of Texas.
The origin of the Lone Star flag of the republic of Texas is not entirely clear. The claim has been made that it was unfurled in the present territory of Louisiana in 1810, but other searchers cannot find earlier trace of it than the presentation of such a banner to the company of Captain Andrew Roanoke in May, 1835. Still another claim made for a flag unfurled at Velasco, Tex., in 1836, and said to have been used by a Miss Troutman of Nashville. One story has it that the star was from the fact that Governor Smith, for lack of a seal, used a brass button from his coat which bore a five pointed star.—St. Louis Republic.

The Word "Capsize."
Linguologists are driven to pure conjecture to explain the origin of the word "capsize." One of them suspects it comes from the Spanish language, as so many sailors' words do. It may be connected with "cabeza" to nod the head in sleep or to sink a ship, and with "captuzar un buque" to sink a ship by the head—meaning head. Another guess is based on the fact that "capsize" is an English dialect word for moving a head by turning it over alternately to its two heads—is that the word simply "cap," a head, and "seize."

Kept Up the Walling.
Alyssa it was once the habit of plaintiffs to stand before the door of the king's palace, loudly appealing for help. "So accused is the king," wrote one traveler, "these querulous tones of sorrow when the rains prevent such as really distressed from repairing to the capital a set of vagrants is provided whose object it is to raise the cry of artificial sorrow lest he should feel a lonely quietness."

Sacredness of the Mantilla.

To the Spanish women the mantilla stands for all that is national and characteristic, and so intimate a part of herself is the mantilla deemed that it is even held sacred by law and cannot be seized for debt.—London Country Gentleman.
