CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

A Proclamation: By the Governor.

I, Wm. M. O. Dawson, governor of the State of West Virginia, pursuant to the constitution and laws of said State, do issue this proclamation announcing to the voters of the State of West Virginia that on Tuesday, next, after the first Monday in November, in the year one thousand nine hundred and eight, at the general election held on that day there will be submitted for ratification or rejection two separate amendments to the constitution of the state, as follows, to-wit:

First Proposed Amendment.
That section four of article four of said constitution be amended so as to read as follows:
"Sec. 4. No person excepting citizens entitled to vote, shall be elected to any state, county, or municipal office; but the governor and judges must have attained the age of thirty, and the attorney general and senators the age of twenty-five years, at the beginning of their respective terms of service; and must have been citizens of the state for five years next preceding their election or appointment, or be citizens of the time the constitution goes into operation."
Said first proposed amendment is designated "Qualification Amendment," and on the ballot will be printed:

(1) "Qualification Amendment."
"Amending section four of article four."
"For Ratification."
"For Rejection."
Those favoring the ratification of said amendment will vote, For ratification; those opposing will vote, For rejection.
Second Proposed Amendment.
That section twenty-three of article eight be amended so as to read as follows:
"Sec. 23. The commissioners shall be elected by the voters of the county, and hold their office for the term of six years, excepting at the meeting of said commissioners they shall designate by lot or otherwise, in such manner as they may determine, one of their number who shall hold his office for a term of two years, one for four years and one for six years, so that no two of said commissioners shall be elected from the same magisterial district. But if two or more persons residing in the same district shall receive the greater number of votes cast at any election, then only one of such persons receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected. Said commissioners shall annually elect one of their number president, and each shall receive four dollars per day for his services in court to be paid out of the county treasury; provided that such compensation may be increased in any county by assent of a majority of the votes cast on the question at any general or special election."
Said second proposed amendment is designated as "County Court Amendment," and on the ballot will be printed:

(2) "County Court Amendment."
"Amending section twenty-three of article eight."
"For Ratification."
"For Rejection."
Those favoring ratification of said amendment will vote, For ratification; those opposing will vote, For rejection.
Given under my hand and the great seal of the state at the capitol this 25th day of July, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and eight, and in the forty-sixth year of the state.

DROUTH CAUSES MILLS TO CLOSE

One Thousand Men Out of Work at Richwood As Result.

RICHWOOD, Oct. 6.—One thousand men are out of work here owing to the long continued drouth and nearly every mill in the region is idle. It has been for over a month since the last rain fell and it will require many days of heavy down-pours to get enough water into the streams to allow the industries to resume.

The Cherry River Paper Company at this place, employing over 250 men was the latest mill to close down on account of water and it will not resume until the streams rise.

The lumber plants at Holcomb, Curtin and Harry Siding, are all idle as there is not sufficient water to supply their boilers.
