WILLIAM E. GLASSCOCK
By a member of the Monongalia County Bar.

William E. Glasscock, the nominee of the Republican party for governor, was born and reared upon a small farm on Indian Creek, Monongalia county, and is one of a family of ten children. His parents were of Scotch descent. His early education was confined to the public schools. In these schools the strong qualities of mind and heart, which were afterwards destined to make him a leader of men, became manifest. When a controversy arose among the pupils of the school "Bill" Glasscock, as he was endearingly called, was always chosen as arbiter. Here also it was that he first acquired a desire for knowledge beyond the province of the public schools. His father being unable to furnish the means necessary to give all his children a higher education, this boy determined to make his own way and earn for himself the means of securing a liberal education. In addition to attending the public schools, he applied himself to nights and mornings to an independent course of study with a view of preparing himself to teach. This he did thoroughly, and at the very early age of eighteen years became a very successful school teacher. So progressive and popular was he as a teacher that in 1887 he was elected county superintendent of free schools of Monongalia county and re-elected in 1889. This office is one of considerable importance in that county owing to the fact that the chief educational institution of the state is located there. During his terms as superintendent of schools he was married to Mary Alice Miller, the accomplished daughter of a neighboring village merchant. To this union three children were born, one of whom, a bright boy of twelve years, is still living. Mr. Glasscock's conduct of the office of county superintendent, and his larger acquaintance with the people of the county, greatly

increased the public confidence in him. Consequently when he offered himself at the next election as a candidate for clerk of the circuit court, he was overwhelmingly nominated in the primary of his party, and afterwards overwhelmingly elected at the general election. The performance of his duties in this office was so intelligent, able and satisfactory that at the end of his term he was re-elected for another term without opposition in his own party.

During his service as clerk he studied law and completed his course at the State University. At the expiration of his second term as clerk he began the practice of law. It was no surprise to his friends to learn that he succeeded from the start. Having naturally a legal mind, and with clear perception, calm patience and tireless energy, he soon became a leader at the bar of his native county, enjoying a lucrative and well paying practice.

On the death of Hon. Thomas E. Davis in 1905, he was appointed Collector of Internal Revenue for West Virginia by Theodore Roosevelt, President of the United States, and since has acceptably filled that office and during his law practice at Morgantown, in all the public trusts he has displayed a full realization of his responsibility, and has conscientiously performed the duties thereof to the fullest extent. His home life is beautiful. Surrounded by a happy family he dispenses a kindly and generous but unostentatious hospitality in true American style. He is now forty-six years of age and in the very prime of life. He is a man of great intellectual force, of gentle manners, considerate of the feelings and welfare of others, and of unassailable Christian character—just such a man as would grace the executive chair of any state—a splendid type of American manhood.
