acres be reduced to \$13 per acre, and that the same be hereafter charged for taxation of said \$13 per acre.

The timber on these lands is said to be marketable at fully \$20 an acre or more and the lands are prospective oil and gas territory. Yet this newspaper finds that the average assessment of the Bennett lands in Braxton county is scarcely one-half of the claimed value of the timber upon them.

Such a situation necessarily leaves the impression on the minds of the voters of the state that there is a tax-dogging effort, and it is no wonder the Democratic newspapers did not accept the invitation of the Telegram to reproduce the records of the county court of Braxton county on the subject.

BIG BARN BURNS

Fairmont Coal Company's Stable at Interstate is Destroyed.

The large barn belonging to the Fairmont Coal Company at Interstate was destroyed by fire Monday evening, causing a loss of about \$2,500. The origin of the fire is unknown. All the horses and mules in the structure were taken out safely, but all of the feed and all of the harness with the exception of two sets were destroyed. The company had \$1,000 insurance on the barn.
