GAME DRIVEN OUT

CUMBERLAND, Md., Nov. 12.—The forest fires in West Virginia along the Baltimore & Ohio road near Marlinton, thirty miles east of Cumberland are driving the game out of the mountains. Four deer in one herd left the West Virginia hills and swam the Potomac river and Chesapeake and Ohio canal, escaping into Town Hill mountain in this county. Hunters pursued the animals, but were unable to bring them down. Wild turkeys by the hundred have also been driven out by the fire from West Virginia to Maryland. The loss in the vicinity of Little Orleans, this county, by the fire has been heavy. Marshall Brinkham has lost a large quantity of timber. Another farmer lost 2,000 cross ties while much bark has been destroyed.
