WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 15.—Mr. and Mrs. Marceon T. Kropps, who have spent all their long lives in West Virginia except the last two or three years, and who now reside in Washington, have just celebrated the seventieth anniversary of their marriage. Mr. Kropps, who is known as the oldest Odd Fellow in West Virginia, is 92 years old, his birthday and wedding day coming together, while his wife is almost 89.

The venerable couple recalled on their wedding anniversary their wedding at Shepherdstown, W. Va., in 1840, when he was 22 and his bride but 19. She was from Charles Town and he from Harper's Ferry, where they resided after their marriage until recently. Among their progeny are six great grandchildren.

Mr. Kropps was initiated into the Odd Fellows in Virginia Lodge at Harper's Ferry in 1859, and has been a member of the order for 71 years, while both he and his wife have been for 75 years members of the Methodist Episcopal church.
