tionary ancestry, for boys and girls who have no social advantages and few opportunities for learning the history and traditions of this country.

Foreign children, or children of foreign parentage, of which there are numbers in every American city and town, are eligible to membership. To teach its members the love of country, reverence for the flag and a high standard of civic honor is the purpose of the organization.

Next I wish to speak to you on patriotic education. Our field grows wider every year. The giving of prizes for essays on historical subjects, presentation of flags and framed Declarations of Independence to schools has been successfully carried out by many of our chapters.

Miss Brown, chairman of the Interchangeable Lecture Bureau, has some very interesting lectures and the slides are excellent. These may be secured for a very small sum. I hope some of the chapters will have at least one of these lectures during the winter and feel sure they will enjoy them, as well as finding them very instructive. The lectures on "Our Flag" and "The Forest," are excellent and are much enjoyed by school children. This is my last appeal to you and I hope each chapter will decide what work it will assume this coming winter and by spring they will be able to report progress along their chosen lines.

Since I have seen your state regent I have written over six hundred letters. I have appointed eighteen regents; nine have been confirmed by the national board. One chapter has been reorganized, and four admitted to our rolls, giving us a total of twelve organized chapters. It is my earnest desire before I make my report to Congress, that I can include at least two or three more chapters organized. Last April the Buford Chapter, of Huntington, joined our band, and has a membership of eighteen. The membership has doubled in our state in the last three years.

If you will pardon some personal words in closing, I desire to say that I have greatly appreciated the honor of holding the office of state regent of West Virginia, and found the work enjoyable and interesting. The path has been made smooth by the willingness and hearty co-operation of all the state officers, who have ever been ready to lend a hand. My relations with the officers of the National Society will be a pleasant memory; my requests to the general officers have been granted; my letters to them have received immediate attention, and they have rendered me most valuable assistance in my work.

In carrying out the work of this office much depends upon the intelligence, punctuality and faithfulness of the regents and officers. It is with greatest satisfaction that I report to this conference that never has there been failure of the slightest obligation. Immediate replies to letters and cheerful compliance with all requirements have been universal.

A continuance of this spirit of unity and devotion will result in the building of a state organization which will be a force, not only among the Daughters of the Commonwealth, but in the National Society itself. A force whose influence and aim is inspired by our own beloved National Society motto: Home and Country.
