Some six years ago there was a slip of an American girl singing in the chorus on the stage in New York. Her voice attracted the attention of managers, and the girl was taken from the chorus and given a leading part in comic opera. After six years in Paris Miss Abbott has returned to the United States to appear as Ysobel in the opera of the same name by Mascagni. The entire musical world is waiting the appearance of Miss Abbott. The question of whether Paris has judged her right in declaring she has a voice of beauty is to be settled by her native countrymen. The opera "Ysobel" is said to be a sensational one in many details. Miss Abbott is called upon to wear striking and sensational costumes—so sensational, in fact, that there has already been much comment over the fact she cannot do much walking about the stage during one scene.

FALL REUNION IS ANNOUNCED

To Be Held Soon in Wheeling By Scottish Rite Masons.

The program has been announced for the fall reunion of the Scottish Rite Masons of West Virginia, to be held in the Scottish Rite cathedral at Wheeling four days, commencing November 23. The executive committee that has had charge of arrangements so far is composed of Thomas J. Watkins, F. C. Steinbecker, Charles F. Schulz, William E. Krupp, John Williams Morris and Luther Blayney, the latter a thirty-third degree Mason.
 The applicants for the Scottish Rite degrees will come from all parts of West Virginia. The candidates will not be obligated to all degrees at the reunion. They may stop after taking the fourteenth, eighteenth or thirtieth degree and receive subsequent degrees at a future reunion.
 Lunch will be served daily at 12 o'clock and dinner at 6 every evening during the reunion. Thursday evening there will be an elaborate banquet served in the magnificent banquet hall at the cathedral.
 On Monday the ineffable degree will be conferred. The candidates will report to the secretary at 8 o'clock Monday morning. At 10 o'clock the fourth degree will be conferred, at 10:30 the fifth and at 1:30 the sixth. After the intermission for lunch the seventh, eighth, ninth, tenth, eleventh, twelfth, thirteenth and fourteenth degrees will be conferred. During several of these sessions music will be rendered by Prof. Henri P. Lintz and the choir of the cathedral.
 The degrees from the fifteenth to the eighteenth inclusive comprise the historical and religious degrees. The fifteenth will be conferred at 9:30 o'clock a. m. The final degree will be given at 7:30 o'clock p. m.
 On Wednesday, the third day of the reunion, the philosophic and chivalric degrees will be conferred upon candidates. The nineteenth will begin at 8:15 o'clock a. m. and the final or thirtieth degree at 7:30 o'clock. The final or ceremonial and official degrees will commence at 1 o'clock Thursday afternoon. The final or thirty-second degree will be given at 2:30 o'clock p. m. The banquet at night will be a most elaborate affair and this will mark the close of the session.
