

CENSUS FIGURES OF STATE'S CITIES

Will Not Be Given Out by the Federal Bureau for Some Time.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 28.—It will be some time before the population of the West Virginia cities will be known, except Wheeling and Huntington, which have already been announced. From now on the practice of giving out the population of cities will be discontinued till after the population of the entire United States by state and counties is ascertained.

The Congress is required by the Constitution to apportion the representation in Congress among the various states after such census and in order that the apportionment may be made promptly the census bureau is exerting its full energy to complete the enumeration of the population of the United States in time for the present Congress to make the decennial apportionment. It is expected that the enumeration will be completed soon after the reconvening of Congress on next Monday.

In the meantime, cities whose populations have not been announced are supposed to have less than 25,000 population, as the recent publication of a list of cities of 25,000 population or more, is supposed to be a complete list of such cities in the country. It is possible that the final figures may place some additional cities in the 25,000 class, but it is pretty certain that the census bureau had sufficiently accurate figures in preparing its list of cities of 25,000 or more to know whether any others should be included in the list or not.

Following the announcement of the total population of the country, few announcements will be made before the first of next year. Future bulletins on population are expected to carry with them data classifying the population of the minor civil divisions of the country, including cities, wards, magisterial districts, etc., and giving data as to their sex, color, race, marital state, age, etc. It will take some time to tabulate these returns and it is not probable that they will be issued before some time next year.

In the meantime, Charleston, Parkersburg, Clarksburg, Fairmont, Bluefield and the other ambitious cities of West Virginia will have to await in patience the announcement of their population, which may not come for months.

Representative and Mrs. Woodyard have taken their old apartments in the Marlborough, one of the fashionable apartment houses of the capital. They have had a family gathering since Thanksgiving Day, their sons, William, Harry and Edward, having come from their school at Nazareth, Pa., to spend the holidays with them. Swearingen, of the Fourth District Republican Congressional Committee, is expected in a few days from Parkersburg. He will report to the House while here the expense of his committee during the recent campaign. The comptroller of the currency has approved the application of the Kenova Banking and Savings Company to be converted into the First National Bank of Kenova, with \$40,000 capital.


