


RAILROAD GATES WILL BE REQUIRED

Committee of Council is Appointed to Look Into the Matter at Once.

The question of requiring the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company to erect and maintain gates at railroad crossings within the city limits engaged the attention of the city council in regular meeting Friday night and refusal to revoke the saloon licenses of Charles E. McBride featured the council's session as a license court.

Members who attended the meetings are Councilmen Connell, Lyden, Ernst, Cork, Robbins, Goff, Smith, Johnson and McReynolds. Mayor Moore presided.

Upon motion duly seconded and carried the minutes of the previous meeting were not read.

City attorney M. G. Sperry reported on the matter of the dedication of certain streets and alleys in the rear of Carr avenue, referred to him at a previous meeting of the council. The report was in writing and was adverse to accepting deeds for the same on the ground that the property laid out there was vacant and there was no urgent need for streets, besides the report stated that the city would be responsible for all damages that might be sustained and would be under the necessity of keeping the streets in order. Upon motion of Mr. Johnson the report was accepted and the council voted not to accept the deeds at present for the streets and alleys.

Railroad Gate Committee.
Councilman Johnson brought up the question of requiring the railroad company to erect and maintain gates at crossings. It was brought out that an ordinance previously passed requiring this to be done would be difficult to enforce owing to its criminal penalty clause as the city under no circumstance is authorized by law to issue warrants against the railroad company. City Attorney M. G. Sperry suggested that the ordinance be so changed as to give the city power to avail itself of civil action in cases of unobservance on the part of the railroad company. The consideration of the question finally resulted in the appointment of Messrs. Sperry, Johnson and Smith a committee to make a report on the subject.

Revocation Licenses.
The council having adjourned as a council immediately re-convened for the purpose of considering license questions. The order being unfinished business, the question of revoking the license of Charles E. McBride as a retail liquor dealer came up for final action, having been pending several weeks.

A list of charges formulated by Councilman Johnson, pursuant to previous directions of the council, and signed by Harry L. Brooks, chief of police of the city, was presented in the form of a petition not sworn to.

Attorney Osman E. Swartz appearing for Mr. McBride objected to the petition on the ground that petitions in courts of justice were usually sworn to before presented. Mayor Moore ruled that the statute did not require the petition to be sworn to. Mr. Swartz asked for an appeal from the chair to the license court proper, as he styled it, on the question, taking the position that the mayor was not properly a member of the license court. This request was refused by the mayor and Mr. Swartz then filed Mr. McBride's answer to the petition.

The city through the mayor insisted that Mr. McBride had violated his license contract by selling the saloon to others who conducted the same as proprietors without having a license. Another charge was that the saloon had been conducted in a very disorderly manner.

Mr. McBride denied that he had ever sold the saloon other than in the customary way, that is to say, conditional upon transfer of licenses.

Hearsay by Brooks.
Chief Harry L. Brooks appeared as a witness for the city but knew but little definitely about the conduct of the saloon, his information being mostly hearsay.

McBride himself on the witness stand adhered to the statements set up in his answer to the petition.

The vote on the question of revoking resulted in declination to revoke, being three to revoke and six against revoking. Those who voted to revoke are Councilmen Johnson, McReynolds and Smith. The application of Frank Rush for a transfer of the McBride license

then came up and the transfer was made by unanimous vote. Adjournment as a license court was taken until Friday morning at 9 o'clock, when the application of Thomas Fee for a saloon on Factory street will be taken up.
