Snider Insinuates.
Millard F. Snider, attorney here,
predicts the defeat of the Demo-
cratic party in the state in 1912, in
a published letter dated January 6.
Mr. Snider briefly reviews the re-
cent history of the Democratic party
in West Virginia, in which he openly
admits that it is his belief that the
Democratic party has lost many a
victory in this state "because the
campaigns were not in charge of
progressive Democrats. He classifies
Democrats in West Virginia as
either "progressive" or "conserva-
tive" and strongly intimates that the
"interests" have a strong hold on a
goodly portion of his party. He
says the party has "Parker" Demo-
crats and "Bryan" Democrats, and
the tenor of his article is that no
Parker Democrat should be elected to
the United States Senate. He
says the "anti-Bryan forces crowded
into the state campaign in 1898,"
and he gives that as one reason the
Democrats did not elect a governor
that year, as in his words Democracy
"ought to have elected a governor."

Judge Snider is rather vague in
his distinction and expression of his
motives or what he is driving at.
Although Alton B. Parker was once
in recent years the Democratic nomi-
nee for President and notwithstanding
Mr. Snider doubtless voted for
him, the learned local attorney leaves
the impression in his letter to the
public that he repudiates Mr. Parker
completely as well as his own
act in voting for him, and desires
none of Parker's counsels in the
party. Bryan leadership seems to
be Mr. Snider's basis of legislative
action on the question of electing
United States senators, although
Bryanism had nothing to do with
the recent political landslide. Mr. Bryan
himself being virtually in political
retirement.

But, Mr. Snider's persistence in dis-
cussing the senatorial question in
this state leads to the conclusion
that he has an intent of some kind.
But, what is it? If he is seeking to
prejudice the members of the legis-
lature against some of the candi-
dates? Or is he voluntarily acting
as a party adviser?

The closing paragraph of his latest
address to the public and especially
to the Democratic members of the
legislature, in which address he pre-
dicts certain defeat to his party un-
less the advice he gives therein is
followed, is quite striking. It im-
presses one with the idea that he is
after one or more of the candidates
for the senatorships with a sharp
knife. But, why not name them?
Here is how the paragraph reads:
"The only safe course for the legis-
lature to follow in choosing United
States senators is to elect open,
avowed, regular, progressive Demo-
crats, that have always stood by
Democratic platforms and heartily
supported William J. Bryan for
President every time he was a candi-
date."

So far as the Telegram knows At-
torney Snider never had more than
one public battle of difference with
any of the candidates for the sena-
torships and in that fight he was
routed by one, who went to the Den-
van convention and voted for Bryan's
nomination. If Mr. Snider has
something to the candidates involv-
ing party irregularities and the like,
he should out with it.

Ira C. Post has been quite promi-
nent in the councils of the Demo-
crats of Harrison county, and now
he is out in a card counseling the
Democrats of the state to send Clar-
ence W. Watson to the United States
Senate. What effect his advice will
have upon the two Democratic dele-
gates from this county is a matter
of conjecture but his words were
weighty in the past.

A fellow signing himself as R. H.
Kidd and writing from Buckhannon
seems to think John W. Davis should
be sent to the United States Senate.
John doubtless is glad he was lucky
enough to break into the lower
branch of Congress. Another accident
within a year might overcome him.

The coming month and a half
West Virginia will have ample op-
portunity to learn the blunder it
made at the last election—a Demo-
cratic legislature is about to meet.
It is an accident that the great ma-
jority of the people of this state
hopes will not occur again for many
years to come.

William E. Chilton, who has an-
nounced his candidacy at last for a
United States senatorship says it is
not a battle but a contest and that
all the candidates are warm friends
of his. Chilton evidently does not
regard John T. McGraw as an en-
trant.

Some of Clarence W. Watson's po-
litical beneficiaries in this county
have gone to Charleston to show
their ingratitude. Mr. Watson will
have ample opportunity there to find
them out.

JAILED FOR MONTH

or Being Drunk Again is Man
by Mayor Moore and
Others Are Ined.

No session of police court was
held this morning as policemen had
made no arrests since the Sunday
morning session.

Nine cases were disposed of Sun-
day morning by Mayor Frank R.
Moore. Charles Traugh, a previous
visitor in the court, was fined \$20
and costs and sentenced to serve
thirty days in jail for drunkenness.
Of three men who were arrested for
fighting in the street near the resi-
dence of John Bassel, two were fined
\$5 and costs each, which they paid,
and the other was discharged as not
guilty. An Italian store clerk who
was arrested on a charge of disorderly
conduct was discharged as not
guilty and another Italian who was
arrested at the same time was fined
\$5 and costs for drunkenness. Three
others paid fines of \$3 and costs
each for plain drunkenness.

HUGHES TO GO

Back to the Capital Unless
He Can Get a Democrat
to Pair.

WASHINGTON, B. C., Jan. 9.—
Unless he can arrange a pair with
some accommodating Democrat,
Representative Hughes, who is busy
with matters connected with his con-
test, will have to return to the cap-
ital. John Dwight, Republican
"whip" of the House, whose duty it
is to round up his party members
for important roll calls, has an-
nounced that he will raise the point
of no quorum and will require a call
of the House roster when too many
members are absent.

"From this time on," said Mr.
Dwight, "the rules of the House re-
quiring the attendance of members
or submission of valid excuses for
absences will be enforced. The state
of the public business requires it."

WOMAN SHIPPED

To Parkersburg by Policemen
After She Had Bidden
Whole Force Defiance.

After bidding defiance to the police
for three or four days a young woman
who gave her name and place of resi-
dence asONEY HARRI, of Pittsburg,
was placed upon a westbound rail-
road train Saturday midnight by
three policemen and sent to Parkers-
burg. She did not want to go and
created a scene at the railroad sta-
tion but the policemen succeeded in
making her stay on the train until
it departed. The police department
had her under surveillance as a no-
torious character since her arrival in
the city and she was deported for
loitering in the streets. She said
there was not a policeman in the city
who could sent her away, but the
three who escorted her to the station
proved that she was mistaken in her
estimate.

ing failed to agree upon a report or
resolution providing for direct popu-
lar election of United States sena-
tors. Another meeting of the com-
