Is Derved by Boy for Saving His Drowning Companion.

POINT PLEASANT, Jan. 20.—Joe Rippet, son of C. C. Rippet, and Stanley Wolf, aged 14, were out at the creek bank after sugar water when Rippet went to the edge of the creek to wash out some bottles, and slipped into the creek over a steep bank into about ten feet of water. When young Wolf, who is much the smaller boy, heard his cries for help, he ran for some distance, pulled off his coat and plunged in to save the life of his companion. He caught his coat tail just as he was going under and pulled him to the top of the water. With great effort he got him to the shore and saved him. The brave lad deserves a Carnegie medal.
