**GRATITUDE SHOWN BY CITY'S COUNCIL**

For Outside Aid Given at the Big Fire Here Friday Night.

At a special meeting of the city council Monday night, that body officially recognized a debt of gratitude to the City of Fairmont and others for the succor given during the recent big fire. The council looked after other questions of minor importance and as a license court transferred two retail liquor licenses.

Mayor Frank R. Moore presided and Clerk Cole's roll call showed six members, namely, Councilmen Connell, Cork, Ernst, Robbins, Johnson and Goff present.

Councilman Goff offered the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted:

"Resolved, That the council of the city of Clarksburg, at a session held this 23rd day of January, 1911, in behalf of the city and itself, hereby expresses unlimited gratitude for the prompt response of the city of Fairmont, and especially the latter's fire department under Chief Reed, to Clarksburg's appeal for aid at the fire that destroyed the Traders block Friday night, January 20, 1911; that this body show its deep appreciation of the valiant services done on that unfortunate occasion by Fairmont firemen in connection with that of Clarksburg's regular and volunteer firemen, by recording here this evidence of a debt of gratitude on the part of this body and citizens generally of Clarksburg, that can only be fully paid under similar distressing circumstances in Fairmont, which this body and the people generally in Clarksburg, sincerely hope may never visit the city that so cheerfully and quickly came to the aid of Clarksburg; that this body is under deepest obligation to the Fairmont & Clarksburg Traction Company, and certain of its employees for so quickly conveying hose from Fairmont to said fire and that the mayor and clerk of Clarksburg, under their official seals, send copies of this resolution to the city council of Fairmont; the chief of the latter's fire department, and proper officials of the Fairmont & Clarksburg Traction Company."

Charles S. Parr, by his attorney, complained that an embankment was slipping away at his property at the corner of Linden avenue and the Phillips Pike, or street, and asked that the matter be referred to the proper committee. This was done.

The question as to whether a certain alley near Poplar street and Park avenue, where a half dozen houses are about to be built, belonged to the city, was referred to the street committee and the city engineer, it being the intention in the event of the alley's belonging to the city to do gradually there before the houses are built so as to save extra expense. Those to whom the question was referred are to make a report.

A resolution passed assenting to the transfer of the saloon license of John G. Beal to John H. Stevens, but prohibiting Mr. Stevens from opening or conducting a saloon in the burned district, there being no building there.

Union Lodge No. 298, I. O. O. F., of Lost Creek, W. Va., will install officers Saturday night. All members and brothers are requested to be present. Refreshments will be served during installation. By order of committee.
