

Kaiser and Czar Join In Killing 492 Stags In Hour



When two rulers of Europe meet there are hurry and bustle on the part of valets and hunters. The valet must prepare a suit for his king, emperor or czar that will do fitting honor to the visiting monarch. For example, when the German emperor and the czar met at Potsdam recently the czar was dressed in the uniform of the Prussian grenadier regiment of the guards, while the German emperor wore a Russian uniform. This exchange of uniforms is supposed to prove that the rulers love each other. Emperor William planned a hunt in honor of the czar, and he had his guns polished and prepared for a week in advance. For one hour these two rulers of millions of people hid behind shields in the Oranienburg preserves, and when the sport was finished 492 stags had been killed. The two rulers did not do all the killing, but many a gentle animal was driven within reach of their guns by the hunting party.

BODY TAKEN THROUGH.

The body of Mrs. Sarah Jane Jenkins, of Weston, was taken through this city Thursday evening to Morgantown, whence it was taken Friday to her former home near Harmon Grove. Funeral services were held there and burial followed at the Burnt Church cemetery. Mrs. Jenkins was 75 years old. Heart trouble was the cause of her death.

BIG DAMAGE SUIT.

Joseph Milligan has brought suit against the Hope Natural Gas Company for \$25,000 for the loss of a leg, while employed at Hastings by that company. The suit was instituted at Parkersburg.

CONTRACT LET

To Pittsburg Firm for the Construction of State Line & Southern Railroad.

MORGANTOWN, Feb. 3 — The contract for the construction of the State Line and Southern railroad, more commonly known to the people of this section as the Buckhannon and Northern, has been let to Patterson, Moran and Luck, of Pittsburg. The contractors are to begin the work of grading and building the necessary masonry between Rivesville and the Pennsylvania-West Virginia line at the expiration of the February term of court, or earlier, if the matters in litigation are disposed of. They are to have the line graded and the masonry constructed by December 1, 1911. Their contract does not include the construction of the bridges and the laying of rails, this being an entirely separate contract.

The successful bidders for the work are to receive approximately \$700,000 for grading and masonry, and the entire cost of the line completed will be about \$1,300,000. The contractors will organize their camps and get the men on the ground as early as weather conditions will permit.

CONFERENCE

Arnold to Meet Parkersburg Committee in Regard to State Convention.

WHEELING, Feb. 2.—Secretary A. T. Arnold, of the State Sunday School Association, will go to Parkersburg Monday to hold a conference with the state convention committee on a number of matters connected with the arrangements for the big event to be held May 2, 3 and 4. Mr. Arnold will leave here Sunday afternoon and will speak at New Martinsville Sunday afternoon and evening.

Miss Martha V. Graham, elementary superintendent, will go to Amos and Rivesville, Marion county, to do some organization work in her department. Work is now in progress at the state headquarters on a program exhibit to be displayed at the state convention. It will contain copies of a large number of programs of all varieties.
