of \$600 for his appearance Friday afternoon for a hearing but Johnson was committed to jail in default of bail.

Five Assyrians and three Americans engaged in the affray, according to the complaints. Knives, clubs, rocks and revolvers were used. Several of the participants were hurt but the most seriously injured was Spurlock. When he was shot in the arm he fell upon the floor and pretended that he was unconscious, so it is reported, but the others jumped upon him and inflicted further injuries by stamping upon him and beating him with clubs. The bullet just grazed his arm and made only a slight wound.

W. J. Maney was also severely hurt with a pick handle in the affray, and he swore out a warrant against John Doe, alias Geise, in Justice W. P. Camp's court, charging felonious assault. A constable attempted to arrest this man at Industrial but the fellow managed to elude the officer. Meaney was struck across the shoulder and arm with the pick handle.

Justice Gordon was informed that Madge Hall conducted the resort, which is said to be a disreputable place, and he and three constables went there Sunday night for the purpose of making a raid and arresting the occupants, but they found the place deserted.


