WASHINGTON, D. C., April 8.—Adam B. Littlepage, congressman from the Third district, who got through fourteen pension cases before he had taken the oath of office, has been notified of some additional pensions in his district which have been granted. Among the last ones granted are: Catharine Collins, Handley, \$12 a month; Samuel Frog, Lewisburg, \$12 a month; G. Imboden, Charleston, \$10 a month; William E.
