ROBERTSON TO SUCCEED BUSH
Friends Predict He Will Be Named to Head Western Maryland Railway.
BALTIMORE, April 14—In the event B. F. Bush is selected to head the Missouri Pacific railroad, the friends of Mr. Alexander Robertson, vice president and general manager of the Western Maryland Railway Company, are predicting that he will succeed Mr. Bush as president of the latter road. Of course, Mr. Robertson's promotion is contingent upon his decision to remain in Baltimore.
Should Mr. Bush accept the presidency of the Missouri Pacific as successor to Mr. George J. Gould, he may insist on Mr. Robertson accompanying him to St. Louis. In case the present vice president and general manager of the Western Maryland decide to leave Baltimore, the interests in control of the Western Maryland would then have to look elsewhere for a man to take the presidency of the Western Maryland.
Those close to the Western Maryland situation say that Mr. Robertson is the logical successor to Mr. Bush, with whom he has labored to rehabilitate the property, and they declare that he can have it if he wants it. It is pointed out that next to President Bush, he is the only man who is thoroughly in touch with every detail of the situation affecting the Western Maryland, and that he is the most capable official who could be entrusted with the property and carry out the big improvement plan which has already been outlined. Mr. Robertson has been President Bush's right-hand man ever since both of these well known and highly popular railroad men came to Baltimore to link their future with the Western Maryland. Like Mr. Bush, he has labored right and day for the interests of the property, and today is always remembered when comment is made in praise of the work that has been done in placing the Western Maryland on the high road to success.
