**PROHIBITIONISTS OPEN CAMPAIGN**

In Support of Amendment with a Big Meeting at Lost Creek.

LOST CREEK, June 7.—The prohibition campaign of Harrison county was opened here Monday night. Although the election is more than a year in the future the advocates of temperance are determined to lose no time in launching their contest in proof of the constitutional amendment prohibiting the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors in the state.

The Rev. B. H. Shaddock, of Mt. Clare, delivered the principal address and for more than an hour he held the interested attention of his hearers. His address was logical and eloquent. He stated that in the next campaign the people would have an opportunity to accomplish the greatest reform ever proposed by abolishing the saloon, and appealed to all present to show no quarter to the enemy until the proposed amendment is written into the state's constitution.

Among other speakers was the Rev. Mr. Kelly, of the Methodist Protestant church here, who spoke on the importance of organization and of beginning the fight as early as possible. The attendance was large and unusual interest was shown. Tuesday evening a similar meeting will be held at Rockford and Wednesday they will address the voters of Mt. Clare. In the near future the Rev. Messrs. Kelly and Shaddock will make a campaign of the county and address meetings at all the important places.

SECOND: By reason of the benefits to be derived from the construction of said bridges, the following parties agree to contribute the following sums to the county court to be used in the construction of the following bridges:

Cecil B. Highland and John B. Hart agree to contribute the sum of \$500 towards the cost of construction of the bridge at the new fair grounds.

Cecil B. Highland agrees to contribute \$126.25 toward the cost of construction of the bridge across the West Fork river at the old fair grounds.

The West Virginia Fair Association agrees to contribute the sum of \$3,117.50 toward the cost of construction of the bridge across Elk creek at the new fair grounds.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the above payments, agreements and stipulations the said county court, party of the second part, agrees to build said two new bridges at or near the old fair grounds and the new fair grounds, respectively, and agrees to contribute the sum of \$3,530.50 towards the cost of construction of the bridge at the old fair grounds, and the sum of \$4,000 towards the cost of construction of the bridge across Elk creek at the new fair grounds, and to satisfy the contractors for the work already done, on said new fair ground bridge.

And the said county court further agrees with the said Fairmont and Clarksburg Traction Company, that for and in consideration of the payments, agreements and maintenance of floors that it (the said county court) will give and grant unto the said traction company the right to build and maintain its street car line along and over the following bridges:

1. Across the bridge at the old fair grounds.

2. Across what is known as the Industrial bridge.

3. Across what is known as the new fair grounds bridge.

But it is understood and agreed, however, that said traction company is to place or build its tracks along one side of said bridges and not in the middle of them.

And the county court further gives unto said traction company one span of the old bridge at the old fair grounds.

**BRIDGE**

Agreement is Entered Into by the County Court and Others.

A belt traction line and a new driveway to the new fair grounds and a new bridge at the old fair grounds depend upon the free granting of rights of way for the traction line and the road, twenty feet for the former and thirty feet for the latter, through lands of the Union Land Company, Granville Kester, Bruce T. Southern and others, the Clarksburg Industrial Company and Mrs. Porter Stout and Col. Joseph Fucey on or before Saturday next as the county court will meet Monday to make final disposition of the following self-explanatory agreement entered into late Monday afternoon:

THIS AGREEMENT, made this 5th day of June, 1911, by and between the Fairmont and Clarksburg Traction Company, a corporation, Cecil B. Highland, John B. Hart, and the West Virginia Fair Association, parties of the first part and the county court of Harrison county, West Virginia, party of the second part.

WITNESSETH, That whereas, the said county court, party of the second part, has agreed to build the following bridges on the following conditions, one bridge across the West Fork river at or near what is known as the old fair grounds, same to consist of two spans each 90 feet in length, and with a roadway 20 feet in the clear, with a sidewalk five feet in width, same to be built along the east side of said bridge, said bridge shall be built strong enough to carry a 34-ton street car. Also one bridge across Elk creek at or near the new fair grounds, same to consist of two spans 60 feet long with a roadway 20 feet in the clear and to be a double arch concrete bridge and to have a capacity to carry.

The conditions upon which the said bridges are to be built are as follows:

The said Fairmont and Clarksburg Traction Company is to pay the county court the sum of \$3,100.00 to be used toward the construction of the bridge at the old fair grounds.

To procure and lay an entire new floor upon what is known as the Industrial bridge that spans Elk creek at what is known as East Clarksburg without any cost whatever to the said county court.

To maintain so long as it uses said bridge, that part of the floor between its outside rail and the

**FAIR GASSER**

Is Drilled by Francis and Company—Other County Oil News.

On Elk creek, Clark district, this county, M. J. Francis and Company have drilled a test well on the M. J. Francis farm into the fifth sand and have a fair gasser.

On Duck creek, Grant district, the West Virginia Central Gas Company has made the location for a test well on the Phineas Queen farm, on the West Fork river, in Grant district, Sperry Brothers have a location made on the W. L. Cole farm, on the same stream C. W. Lynch has started to drill a test well on the C. W. Lynch farm. In the same district, M. G. Sperry has a rig completed for a test on the John Watson farm.

In the north end of the Shinnston oil pool in Clay district, the South Penn Oil Company has drilled a second test well on the H. E. Swiger farm through the fifty-foot sand, the producing formation of that district, and has a duster. This location is but a short distance from three good producers. In the same district and locality the South Penn Oil Company has drilled its No. 7 on the S. L. Vincent farm nine feet into the fifty-foot sand and the hole has filled up 1,000 feet with fluid.
