Keep an eye on Fairmont Farms next Saturday. There will be "big doings" there that day. Perhaps, the fate of the Democratic party in this state depends on what goes on there Saturday. It is expected that a "political cloud" will overshadow the social features and the latter will be brilliant.

If Senator Watson, just in the political field, controlled a great number of the legislature, can he not control a state committee composed of a far less number of men? He accomplished a big feat easily. Why can he not accomplish a little trick more easily?

A Charleston Democratic correspondent says the hands of Senator Watson or anyone else will be tied by the state committee, if an attempt is made to select delegates to the national convention without the consent of the committee. The idea advanced is that the state committee will assume dictatorship in the selection of delegates, and yet the public hears a great Democratic machine cry going up against the Republican state committee. The colors should yank the beam out of their own eye.

There was great rejoicing among Democratic leaders in Marion county the other day, when Judge John W. Mason announced his intention to retire at the end of his present term. There is no abler nor better nor fairer judge in the state than Judge Mason. Judging from the rejoicing in camp, Judge Mason's qualities do not suit the Marion county Democratic leaders. Watch the Democratic state machine getting busy putting in a judge there of its own liking.

In the practice of their profession two Republican lawyers at Parkersburg came to blows. Because they were both Republicans, a desperate Democratic press seeks to make the impression that it was a political feud. To show just how silly such a conclusion is, suppose one of the lawyers had been a Democrat or both had been Democrats. Democracy is certainly grasping at the last straw, when it resorts to such political argument as that.

It comes in very bad grace from the Democratic machine press to talk about turning property over to Judge Goff as all remember that that machine thwarted the will of the people, when it robbed him of the governorship. The mere mention of Goff's name politically does send cold shivers down the spinal column of the Democratic state machine and it is useless for it to try to deny that fact. The machine knows it will be a mighty freeze out for it, when Judge Goff gets actively into politics and gold shivers are the beginning of the end.

Knife too Dull.
All West Virginians except the members of the Democratic state machine are pleased with the appointment of Guy D. Goff as United States district attorney for the eastern district of his adopted state. The name of Goff is too much for the Democratic bosses. It brings an unpleasant reminder to them and it brings terror to them as they know that the people of this state have never forgotten the fact that

most of those in the Democratic saddle now were participants in the outrage of counting the father of the son out of the governorship. Lately their subsidized press, tried to soft soap the distinguished father but they showed their real hand, when they stealthily tried to knife the son in the United States Senate West Virginia is pleased over the fact that they were thwarted. They stole the governorship from the father, but they could not cheat the son out of the district attorneyship.

Exponent's Fallacy.
The fallacy of the argument of the Exponent that what it terms the Republican state machine is all the support President Taft has in this state is shown in its own argument. For instance, it says S. B. Avis, prosecuting attorney of Kanawha county, and ex-Congressman Joseph H. Gaines are both avowed Taft adherents. That fact tells a situation for broader than the Exponent intended to convey. Avis and Gaines were bitter opponents for political honors last year and no one rated them as being political bedfellows, yet both are in the Taft bandwagon.

The Exponent might have added while it was calling attention to the fact that Charles W. Swisher had declared for Taft, and that Arnold C. Scherr also recently declared himself for Taft, and then if it was imbued with the idea of clearly setting forth the situation, it would have called attention to the bitter struggle between Swisher and Scherr in the last campaign. It certainly would not have been laborious to state that these two men are not political bedfellows either but they are both in the Taft column. There are many other leading Republicans who differed in the last campaign on state questions, yet many of them are united on Taft's re-election. These facts are so plain and so well known that it is useless for any Democratic newspaper to attempt to mislead by not making a full statement of facts. Machine or no machine, it is plainly apparent that the Republicans of West Virginia as a whole are for President Taft and it is a waste of words on the part of the Democratic press to try to show otherwise. Facts are facts and they are so plain in this connection that they can not be distorted with an iota of success.

"Deal" is Confirmed.
The Democratic state machine's Charleston specializer was busy at the end of the week denying that a "deal" had been made between the state machine and Governor Harmon, by which the machine is to hand over a solid delegation from West Virginia to Harmon for the Democratic nomination for President next year. The denial reads as thin soup tastes—without substance.

The machine correspondent brings Senator Watson's name into the matter and would like to leave the impression that that gentleman and the state committee and not in sympathy. Here is what the correspondent says about him:
"Any attempt to 'steam roller' over a certain ticket could not be achieved by Senator Watson or any one else without the committee."

The specializer makes a clear admission in the statement quoted that Senator Watson has a "deal" on with Harmon, but the correspondent tries to cover this up with a degree of confusion. He appears to be unwilling to concede that Senator Watson controls the committee and thereby hangs a tale. Senator Watson is a part of the Democratic state machine, one of the big Democratic bosses of the state, and there is no party man to deny that fact. The specializer's admission that Senator Watson is pushing the Harmon campaign in the state and the correspondent's attempt to say that the state committee must be reckoned with have a rightful deduction which in effect may be defined that the state machine and the state committee are not one and the same, and, therefore, there is a gulf between the controlling elements of the party. The specializer's logic must be most displeasing to the machine bosses and it is not at all probable that the specializer will make another "break" like the one he made as herein quoted.

The very fact that he said in his denial just what the Democratic machine bosses did not want him to say is evidence conclusive of the weakness of the denial and that weakness in turn emphasizes the fact that the Democratic state machine found itself up a tree, when its "deal" with Governor Harmon to turn this state over body and soul to him notwithstanding the great anti-Harmon sentiment existing in the party, was exposed. The denial is of such a character that it merely confirms the statement of a "deal." Governor Harmon has been promised a solid delegation from West Virginia and the specializer shows that Senator Watson is a party to the "deal."

Another Important Admission
made by the specializer is that the Democratic state committee's consent must be had in the selection of delegates. The specializer serves notice on the party that the rank and file must not expect to voice any presidential sentiment or preference that is not approved by the state committee. In other words the bosses are to choose the delegates. They are to say how West Virginia is to vote at the national convention, and this again bears out the statement that there is a "deal."
