BUTCHER KNIFE DRAWN IN FIGHT

Greeks Clash in Boarding House Over Alleged Robbery of Money.

Frank Wals, a young Greek, was arraigned before Mayor Frank R. Moore this morning in police court on a charge of attempting to stab a fellow countryman with a butcher knife last night in a room of Frank Lovett's boarding house on Clark street, Glen Elk. The case was continued until evening so as to obtain the testimony of Policeman James Simms, who arrested the young man, and Wals was remanded to jail.

The complainant, a middle aged man, said he caught Wals taking some money from a pocket of his trousers. When the former remonstrated, Wals, he said, drew a long butcher knife and attempted to cut him with it. The older man caught Wals by the neck and threw him upon a bed. During the scuffle the butcher knife was broken at the hilt. The knife was submitted as evidence in the case. Both men had been employed as laborers on the Clarksburg and Weston trolley line.

Two men pleaded guilty of drunkenness in the street. One was fined \$3 and costs and as the other had been in police court only a few days ago he was fined \$5 and costs. Both paid and were released.

WEST VIRGINIA HELPS VIRGINIA

Former's Failure to Supply Markets Increases Old State Production.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—The failure of West Virginia to supply certain eastern markets is given by Edward W. Parker, of the United States Geological Survey, as the cause of the heavy increase in the production of coal in the State of Virginia in the year 1910.

The coal produced in Virginia in 1910 increased to 6,507,992 short tons with a spot value of \$5,877,488. This was an increase of 1,755,780 tons or nearly 37 per cent over the production in 1909, which was the banner year up to that time. The value of the coal increased \$1,626,430 or 35 per cent. Two new records were established by Virginia in coal production in 1910. The quantity of coal produced, the amount and percentage of increase both being records for the state. Explaining this heavy increase, Mr. Parker said:

"The strike in the middle west naturally created an unusual demand upon the coal-mines of West Virginia, and a large part of the production of that state, customarily sent to the seaboard, was diverted to the temporarily more profitable markets in the west. This demand in turn gave opportunity for a larger outlet to the seaboard for Virginia coals of white West Virginia coal men were not slow to take advantage."

Virginia is credited by Mr. Parker as having produced the first bituminous coal mined in the United States. This was produced not in the present well-known regions of the Southwestern part of the state, but at Richmond. The Richmond basin, as it was termed, was a small area near the city of Richmond.

"The existence of coal," said Mr. Parker, "in the Richmond basin was known as early as 1700, though mining did not begin till the latter part of the century. In 1789 shipments were made to some of the northern states. In 1822 the production amounted to 54,000 short tons. For nearly a century the Richmond basin
