FLOCKING TO CITY LESS IN THE STATE

Of West Virginia Than the Ratio Throughout the United States.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 12.—West Virginia's population, like that of the United States as a whole, is rapidly drifting into the cities, according to statistics given today by the census bureau. But the trend cityward in West Virginia is not so pronounced as it is in the country at large.

While the city population of West Virginia is increasing rapidly, the country population of the state is increasing much more rapidly than that of the United States.

While in 1910, the city population of the United States was 46.5 per cent of the total population, in West Virginia it was 18.7 per cent. In 1900 it was 40.5 in the whole country and 13.1 in West Virginia.

In 1890 the city population of the country was 36.1 per cent of the whole, while in West Virginia it was but 10.7. This shows that while the city population of West Virginia bears a much lower ratio to the whole than the city popula-

tion of the entire country bears to the total population of the country, at the same time the city population of West Virginia is gaining and the rural population faster than the city population of the country as a whole. In 1900 the total population of the country was 91,378,866, of which the city population was 42,823,383. In 1910 the entire population of West Virginia was 1,221,119, of which the city population was 228,242.

The city population of the country increased 34.9 per cent from 1900 to 1910, while the city population of West Virginia in the same time increased 66 per cent. The rural population of the entire country increased 11.1 per cent while the population of West Virginia increased 20.9 per cent.

Thus it will be seen that both the city and country population of West Virginia are increasing faster than in the country at large, but that the percentage of city population to the whole population is not so large in West Virginia as in the country at large.
