NO STRIKE

Of Baltimore and Ohio Telegraphers is Looked for by Officials.

WHEELING, Sept. 27.—Dispatches from Baltimore say that a strike of operators on the Baltimore and Ohio railroad system is imminent. Telegraphers, telephoners, lever men and station men have voted, it is said, for a strike to be declared October 1, unless the company meets their demands for a 10 per cent increase in wages, fifteen days' vacation with pay and shorter hours on some parts of the line.

Local officials of the Baltimore and Ohio do not think the telegraphers will strike. They believe the alteration will be settled without difficulty and that there will not even be danger of a strike.

One official said: "The telegraphers, as a general rule, are a quiet, well educated, peaceful sort of a set, who dislike trouble of any sort. I do not believe the company can afford to grant their demands, but do think they will compromise."

Telegraphers employed by the Baltimore and Ohio here still retain the silence they affected from the first and refuse to give out any information whatsoever, other than ballots have been received for those eligible to vote. They would not express their views regarding the increase in salary and annual vacation.
