

OLDEST MAN

In the State to Receive a Commission as a Notary.

CHARLESTON, Sept. 30—"How long is a notary commission good for?" was the question asked by W. V. Chidester, of Weston, Lewis county, in applying for a notary commission.

The question is one often asked but not from a man 85 years old, to which Mr. Chidester can lay claim. Most men who reach the four score and five mark have difficulty in writing a legible hand, but not so with the aged Westonian, who not only writes a very good hand, but had applied with the proper remittance, and the notary commission went out yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Chidester is the oldest man to receive a notary commission in the history of the state and if he lives until his commission expires he will be one of the few who attain the age of 95. The oldest person heretofore to receive a notary commission was 71 years. This, at least, is the belief of some of the older clerks in the office of the secretary of state who say a man laying claim to 71 years applied for and was issued a notary commission a few years ago and that he was believed to have been the oldest man up to that time.

the proceedings relating to prisoners in Belem, the big local fall, who are now under sentence of death. He explains that the jail is too crowded and that the cells these men occupy are needed for others. Plans have been made and accepted for a new jail, but, realizing that it will be a long time before the historic and notorious prison Belem can be abandoned, the governor has urged that it be enlarged and remodeled in order to make better sanitation possible and to afford more room. The average number of prisoners confined there is about 3,500.
