DEADLY STEAM KILLS TWO MEN

In the Somerset, Pa., Mine of the Consolidation Coal Company.

CUMBERLAND, Md., Nov. 2.—Frederick Taschenberger, unmarried, 35 years old, and a man named Shunk, are dead from scalds sustained in the bursting of a valve at the operation of the Consolidation Coal Company at Jenner, Somerset county, Pa., Tuesday afternoon. They had assisted in putting in a turbine pump, and when it started for a test the valve burst and both were engulfed by steam. Shunk lived only about two hours. Taschenberger was taken to the Allegheny hospital, last night at 6 o'clock on train No. 14 over the Baltimore and Ohio railroad by his brothers, Ernest and Edmund Taschenberger, of North Branch, who went after him. Dr. John R. Littlefield met them at Rockwood and took charge of the injured man. Mr. Taschenberger was scalded about the face, arms and chest. He also inhaled the steam. He lived less than three hours after arriving at the hospital.

Mr. Taschenberger had worked at Garrett previous to going to Jenner last April to work on repairs. He is survived by his father, Carl Taschenberger, of North Branch; four brothers, William Taschenberger, of Spring Gap, Md.; Hugo Taschenberger, of Youngwood, Pa.; and Edmund and Ernest Taschenberger, and one sister, Mrs. A. E. Stealy, of North Branch.

The body of Mr. Taschenberger was removed last night to the undertaking rooms of Louis Stein.

Are the Wells Now Being Drilled in By Various Companies.

Light wells are reported from all districts in West Virginia. On Dutchman run, Murphy district, the Southern Oil Company has completed its No. 7 on the Dawson heirs' farm and has a seven-barrel pumper in the salt sand. On the South fork of Hughes river the R. Wilson Oil and Gas Company has

completed a second test on the S. E. Smith farm and has a 1,000-000-foot gasser in the salt sand. In the same locality, the Haught farm Oil Company has drilled a second test on the Haught-Braden farm through the salt sand and has a show for a ten-barrel pumper. In the Burning Springs district, Wirt county, Emma A. Maples has completed and shot No. 19 on the Rathbone oil tract, and has a light pumper in the Cow Run sand. In the same district, Gibson Brothers are due in the sand at No. 11 on the Rose Whiteman farm.
