At rules held in the Clerk's office of the Circuit Court of Harrison County, on Monday, the 6th day of November, 1911, the following order was entered:

VS. IN CHANCERY.
Victoria Bates, Cory M. Lyons and M. C. Lyons.

The object of the above entitled suit is to cancel, annul, and set aside as fraudulent and void a certain deed bearing date the 7th day of December, 1910, made by the said Cory M. Lyons and M. C. Lyons to Victoria Bates, which deed conveyed to Victoria Bates a certain tract or parcel of land, situated on the waters of Mud Lick Run, in Sardis district, Harrison County, West Virginia, containing 24 acres, more or less, except the coal thereunder with certain mining rights thereto conveyed, and a part of the oil and gas thereunder, and recorded in Deed Book No. 191, at page 150; and also to subject said tract or parcel of land to the payment of a certain judgment obtained in the Circuit Court of Harrison County, West Virginia, on the 15th day of May, 1911, by plaintiff against Cory M. Lyons and M. C. Lyons for the sum of FOUR HUNDRED and TWENTY-NINE DOLLARS, with interest thereon from the 29th day of November, 1910, until paid, and costs amounting to FIFTEEN and 40-100 DOLLARS, which judgment was based upon a certain note made, executed and delivered on the 14th day of September, 1909, by the said Cory M. Lyons and M. C. Lyons, together with one G. W. Woodfield to plaintiff, for the sum of FOUR HUNDRED DOLLARS, with interest, and due seven months after the date thereof, and great plaintiff general relief.

Lyons are non-residents of the State of West Virginia, it is ordered that they and each of them do appear here within one month after the date of the first publication hereof and do what is necessary to protect their interests.
