

**LACK OF INTEREST SHOWN BY STATE**

Of West Virginia in the National Rivers and Harbors Congress.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 7.—West Virginia is not showing the usual interest in the annual convention of the National Rivers and Harbors Congress, now in session here, and aside from the Huntington delegates is poorly represented, as far as numbers are concerned. Whether it is because the improvement of the Ohio river is practically provided for or for some other reason, there are fewer delegates present from the state at the present meeting than at any other meeting for years. Huntington maintains its former reputation of sending the banner delegation from the state, having more than a dozen persons at the meeting, including D. E. Abbott, president of the chamber of commerce, and Elliott Northcott, United States minister to Nicaragua, who does not expect to return to his post until about the first of the year.

West Virginia's lack of interest in the meetings of the Rivers and Harbors Congress would seem to be rather ill-timed, for although the completion of the Ohio river improvements within a few years now

seems certain, still there are several other rivers in the state for which improvements will be asked. The Little Kanawha has been clamoring for years for an extension of the improvements in that river and the most recent report of the engineers on that subject is expected to be presented to Congress in a few days. The Big Sandy, the Guyandotte and other streams have been under consideration for some time and have not yet had the attention the residents of their sections think should be accorded them. Congressman Littlepage wants to improve the Elk river and there is talk of the necessity of increasing the depth of the Big Kanawha river, which lacks several feet of the depth the Ohio will have when the pending improvements on that stream have been completed.

Altogether there is much to work for yet in West Virginia and it would seem that in view of the closeness of the state to Washington, the amounts which have been expended in the state and the amounts which are still sought, together with the vast good which has come from the meeting of the Rivers and Harbors Congress, there would have been a larger attendance from the state at the present meeting.

**GREAT ADVANCE MADE BY STATE**

Of West Virginia in the Cultivation of Weed Known as Tobacco.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 7.—West Virginia has made the most remarkable advance as a tobacco producing state of any state in the nation, according to figures comparing the tobacco growing industry of 1909 with that of 1889, just made public by the census bureau. The acreage has increased 249.5 per cent in the ten years; the production 385 per cent and the value of the crop 741.2 per cent. This increase was exceeded only by North Dakota, which grew from one acre of tobacco in 1889 to six acres in 1909.

The District of Columbia, Wyoming and Nevada are the only states or districts which grew no tobacco in 1909 and of all the others West Virginia showed the greatest actual increase. In 1889 West Virginia had in tobacco 5,129 acres; in 1909 it had 17,927 acres. In 1889 West Virginia produced 3,087,140 pounds of tobacco; in 1909 it produced 14,356,400 pounds. In 1889 the value of this product was \$228,620; in 1909 it was \$1,923,180. Twenty states showed a decrease in the value of tobacco raised.

**PIPE DREAM**

Is An Article Sent Out from Washington to the Fairmont Times.

The Washington end of the Democratic state machine is having more pipe dreams as shown by an article from Washington in the Fairmont Times Thursday morning, to the effect that President Taft has been warned by State Chairman Virgil L. Highland and former State Chairman Matthews that he is likely to lose the vote of West Virginia in the national convention next year unless the delegates from the state are instructed next year.

When Chairman Highland's attention was called to the dispatch, he said:

"I have not seen President Taft since he visited Clarksville several months ago. I have had no correspondence with him or with any one for him.

"There is no more truth in the dispatch than in many other articles sent out from Washington to the Democratic state press. I have never discussed the question of delegates to the national convention with any one. The Washington dispatch in the Fairmont Times is simply a pipe dream."

**BILL INTRODUCED.**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—Senator Oliver, of Pennsylvania, has introduced a bill to grant a pension to Rutherford B. Mitchell, of McKees Rocks, Pa., a veteran of the Spanish-American war, who was a member of the First West Virginia volunteer infantry.
