The loss is about two-thirds covered by insurance. Among the losees are more than a score of dwelling houses. The Flat Top Ice and Storage Company suffered the greatest loss, its plant being valued at \$50,000. Other losses were Tony and Thomas, merchants, \$30,000; Armour and Company, \$15,000; and Hotel North Fork, \$20,000.
